FOR OLD SOLDIERS. A bill has been introduced in the House by five authors.

The Bramblethorn Rivers, Messrs. Laurin and Henthorn, to put on the honor roll all Confederate soldiers, sailors and widows and to compensate them for services rendered from 1861 to 1865.

The purpose of the bill is to give all Civil War Veterans and widows the benefit of the government fund.

ADMITTS INFLUENZA SERUM IS USELESS.

U. S. Laboratory Director Says No Cure for Baffling Disease is Known.

Considering that the insurance companies of the United States lost about \$100,000,000 during the three months last year when the influenza epidemic was at its height, it is but natural that when the Association of Life Insurance Medical Directors met in annual convention in Newark last week the physicians and public health authorities should consider themselves almost exclusively to the search for some "cure" measure which would preclude another outbreak of the plague.

And yet, although it was shown that about 90,000 people in the world perished from it, 400,000 of whom were Americans, all the medical experts admitted that the disease was completely baffling.

Said Dr. G. W. McCoy, director of the Hygienic Laboratory of the Public Health Service in Washington:

"There is no serum that I know of which is of the slightest value in preventing influenza, nor is there any serum that in any way whatever is the treatment of the disease."

He made this statement after carefully experimenting with serum and vaccines in all parts of the country where the disease had been on foot and particularly in Pelham Bay and the army camp which the mortality was highest.

Agreeing with him, Dr. Frederick L. Hoffman, vice-president of the National Insurance Company, said:

"The epidemic from a life insurance point of view is the epidemic of the subject of thorough and prolonged scientific investigation. If such epidemic can neither be successfully prevented nor successfully prevented after serious outbreaks have occurred the solution of the problem would seem to be in the direction of better methods of prevention."

The number of deaths in New York city, he said, was 12,130. In one week in Boston the epidemic killed the maximum mortality of 154 in every household.

DRIP FRUIT MAKES THESE GOOD THINGS

While fresh fruits are scarce and high use the dried fruits. They are extremely wholesome and high in concentrated food value.

Here are good dried fruit recipes. To prepare for cooking such fruits as raisins, apricots, apples, peaches, figs and prunes, first wash them carefully in warm water to remove dust, then put in a cooking pan to soak in cold water for from three to six hours.

Apple-Pudding - Steam and sweeten. Sprinkle 2 cupsful of dried apples and when tender, add through a sieve or colander. To the fruit pulp add 1 cupful of thick boiled custard or of creamy boiled rice.

Prune-Mixture - In a bowl and set near the fire or outdoors to chill. Before serving beat in the stiffly beaten whites of 2 eggs. Serve on squares of fresh bread, with cream and nutmeg.

Coconut-Raisin Pudding - Mix together 1 cupful of white flour and 1/2 cupful of rolled oats, and stir in 1 teaspoonful salt and 4 teaspoonful baking powder.

Work into the mixture 1/2 cupful of shredded coconut and 1/2 cupful of raisins. Mix with 2 cupsful of skim milk. Pour the mixture into a greased mold and steam two hours. Serve with cream or custard sauce. -Selected.

No Potash From France Before June. Even under the most favorable circumstances no potash from France could be available in the United States for agricultural uses before June 1, 1919, according to an announcement issued by the War Trade Board.

Under the terms of the agreement with the French High Commission in the United States, France will be unable, according to the announcement, at least until April, to ship potash from the potash mines of Alsace. The advisers further indicate that for the next few months practically the entire potash output of the Alsatian mines will be urgently required for agricultural purposes in France.

The view of the War Trade Board that it will be necessary for the United States to rely entirely upon its domestic potash production for the coming spring season.

Farmers' organization or farmers who are in a position to buy potash in carload lots can secure it from the Government at a reduction on the retail price at present quoted. The Bureau of Sales, Department of Agriculture, will furnish a list of American potash producers upon application.

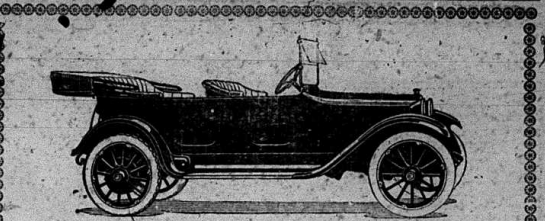
