Dulin's field goal and foul shot were the only points scored by Roosevelt in the second period, while Emmett Scott collected 12 points. Roosevelt made a strong bid to come back in the third period, but Emmett Scott re-bounded from a four minute scoring drought to keep the Tigers at a six point disadvantage. The Rattlers held a 47-34 lead at the end of the three stops, but balooned that to point lead (54-34) with five minutes left in the game. The Rattler coaches inserted reserves into the lineup with two left to finish the

game.


