**In Jail Charged With Murder**—George Gaines, colored, was placed in the Chester county jail at noon today charged with the murder of Frank Abell, another negro, the tragedy having occurred on the plantation of Mr. Claude Rattersee near Hicklin's Station Sunday afternoon about four o'clock.

Isabelle Hemphill, an aged negro, one of the local hospital nursing from a gunshot wound she received at the hands of Gaines. From information obtainable it appears that Gaines was shooting at the brother of Frank Abell when a stray bullet hit the Hemphill woman. The News understands that she is seriously injured.

Gaines was recently discharged from the army and when brought to Chester today was wearing his uniform.

As soon as Sheriff Anderson learned of the tragedy he left for the scene of the murder. He returned to Chester last night and telephoned Mr. Claude Rattersee about the matter and the probable location of Gaines. Mr. Rattersee found Gaines and brought him to Chester today. The murder, we understand, was the result of a feud about a negro woman.

### Shall Germany Be Left Unpunished?

Paris dispatches to Democratic and Republican papers alike, declare that the American Peace Commission, which, of course, means President Wilson—is opposed to making Germany pay the cost of the war.

The dispatch to the New York Tribune, which is very similar to special dispatches to other papers, says: "A message of the gravest importance has been sent to President Wilson by the Allies regarding the impasse existing over the interpretation of the word 'reparation.' Although the contents of the message have not been divulged to the press, it is known the European Allies are again pressing Mr. Wilson to permit them to impose a portion, if not all of the war costs on the enemy countries besides make reparation."

"The situation has almost a pathetic character for France and Italy. The people have been promised relief from an overwhelming burden of taxation. But that is not all. The fear is that if the victims of the war have to bear the cost Germany will be left commercially victorious because of the havoc she has wrought.

"Germany's lands and properties escaped military seizure. She is now gaining hate in making peace, even if it is told, using the fact that American troops across the Rhine are fraternizing with the Germans to impress the Allied statesmen with the urgent necessity for quick settlement.

"Who is going to yield is now the question—Mr. Wilson or the Allied promoters of the peace."

"It is feared in some quarters that serious declines in the value of securities in all Allied countries will occur if Germany is required to make reparation only and not shared the cost."

"Premier Clemenceau was on the way to the Quai d'Orsay to meet Colonel House and Mr. Balfour to discuss this subject when he was shot."

"Many months ago we warned the country that the tremendous power of the big financial interests of Germany would work through neutral countries and even through America itself to save Germany from adequate punishment and to keep that country from having to pay the cost of the war to America and the Allies. But we are the people of America willing to see our Allies and our own country for many years to come pay enormous war taxes in order that the German murderers may be saved from doing so."

"Are we willing to see Americans taxed to the utmost that Germany may go free?"

"Are we willing to see our Allies burdened to the breaking point in order that a nation of justful murderers should escape the penalty of their crimes?"

"If we should take such a stand as this we would go contrary to the teachings of God himself and we would simply encourage Germany to prepare for another war."

"The duty of civilization is to make Germany repudiate every dollar of its war indebtedness, that its own people from the highest to the lowest may learn the financial penalty of their crimes, and then to place upon Germany the burden of making good if it did not wish it would not have to pay the cost."

### Meeting Of Stockholders

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Chester Building & Loan Association, held in the Court House last night. The association's year ends in October but the annual meeting was not held last October on account of the influenza epidemic, hence the meeting last night.

The report of the treasurer showed the assets of the stock in each series and the number of shares as follows: Series 10, 415 shares, value \$90.91; Series 11, 306 shares, value \$71.47; Series 12, 224 shares, value \$51.68; Series 13, 226 shares, value \$49.09; Series 14, 979 shares, value \$25.40; Series 15, 1137 shares, value \$12.33.

This makes a total of 3787 shares in force October 1918. Series number 16 opened with 778 shares, which gives the association a grand total of 4566 shares now running. Series number 16 will be matured and paid off in October, 1919. The stock of the association earned 8 per cent interest for the past year.

### Dr. Love Goes To New York

Many Chester friends will be pleased to learn that Dr. S. G. Love, who recently returned to Chester from France, left last night for New York City where he has accepted a position as assistant surgeon in one of the large hospitals in that city.

Dr. Love's going to New York was brought about by his coming in contact with Lieutenant Colonel Morehead of New York, while in the army. Dr. Morehead is one of the most prominent and successful surgeons of New York City being chief surgeon for many of the largest corporations of New York State. In addition to his regular surgeon duties he has charge of all of Dr. Morehead's patients and will probably be associated here with Dr. Morehead's staff.

It will be recalled that Dr. Love offered his services to the Episcopal States Unit 1917 and was ordered to the British army and was ordered to the British army, where he served under Prof. Dain, who is professor of surgery of Edinburgh. After leaving Scotland, Dr. Love went to Leeds, England, where he served under Prof. Monahan, an abdominal specialist.

After completing his course at Leeds Dr. Love went to France with the British army as regimental surgeon, and was with the British army during the retreat in March 1918.
