YOUNG MEN CHARGED WITH CRIME RELEASED

Not Assailants of Young Abberline - Girls Governor Cooper to Offer Reward for Apprehension of Guilty Parties.

Columbia, March 17.—James B. Wallace and Lee Bourne, the two young men who were arrested in connection with the abduction of young Abberline last Sunday afternoon, will be released today on the statements of the two girls that Wallace and Bourne were not their assailants. The two young women were brought to Columbia yesterday to see the girls, and are most positive in their declarations that the men under arrest are not the guilty parties. Governor Cooper will order the release as soon as authorized by Solicitor Homer S. Blackwell of the Eighth circuit. The governor will also offer a reward for the apprehension of the men who committed the dastardly crime. A special term of court would have been requested had identification been made.

BRYAN AGAIN URGES DEMOCRATIC BREAK

Nebraska Visits Washington and Says Majority Should Win in Ratification Fight

Washington, March 17—William J. Bryan arrived here today from Florida en route to New York to deliver an address Friday night and immediately became a participant in the eleven-hour negotiations of Democratic senators working for a compromise of the peace treaty.

Although Mr. Bryan said he did not intend to visit the senate nor intervene in the treaty situation, Democratic senators began to come to his aid before he had finished his breakfast.

Mr. Bryan gave out another statement urging ratification of the treaty.

For Democratic senators to join with the "irreconcilables" in defeating the treaty, he said, "is unthinkable in the eyes of the Democratic party."

Mr. Bryan said it would be "unthinkable" for the Democratic party to deny the right of a majority of the senate to declare the senate's policy.

SOUTHERN WILL PAY ITS OWN WAY

Refuses to Accept "Standard Return" at President

Atlanta, March 16—The Southern Railway System will not accept the "standard return" provided in the new Transportation Act, it was learned here today, but will back up the belief of its officials in the continued prosperity of the South by relying on its own earnings during the next six months, it was learned tonight.

President Fairfax Harrison, after a trip through the South, came to the conclusion that conditions were such that the Southern Railway System could produce results which would equal or surpass the government guarantee. The decision will affect the Southern Railway Company, the Cincinnati, New Orleans and Texas Pacific, the Alabama and Georgia, the New Orleans and Norfolk, and the Norfolk and Western Railroad companies.


Had the Southern Railway System qualified for the government guarantee its net income for the next six months would have been assured of being \$12,500,000. Local officials of the South were notified today that the guarantee would not be accepted.

ALLIED ARMY AND NAVY HOLDING CONSTANTINOPLE

Constantinople, March 17—Allied troops have occupied this city and the great guns of the British dreadnoughts were moved to quays, or anchored in the Golden Horn, command both sides of the Bosphorus. Every ship is cleared for action.

The signal arrival of the allied forces caused little alarm, nor were there any signs of panic except in Stamboul. Shopkeepers near the war offices closed their places of business when it was heard the allies were coming, but the troops inspired confidence and the stores were soon reopened.

All the allied powers participated in the movement, being under orders from the British commander-in-chief here, the Italian contingent, including detachments having formations on the coasters. Four thousand
