Heart disease increasing among young women

Precautions should be taken to decrease risk

Cardiovascular disease, commonly known as heart disease, is the number one killer of women. It affects women of all backgrounds and the risk is increasing, especially for younger women.

Heart disease claims the lives of more than 500,000 women each year, with African-American women accounting for more than 71 percent.

According to the American Heart African-American Association, women have a 55 percent higher chance of developing heart disease than Caucasian women. Younger women, ages 15-34, are suffering more from the disease.

Heart disease can take a strong toll on the loved ones of victims. Tomeika Banks, a 20-year-old biology major from Anderson, S.C., lost her father about 15 years ago from a heart attack.


"Something like this is such a cathartic event that it changes your whole lifestyle," Banks said.

Banks realizes she may be at a greater risk because she is an African-American female and her father suffered from heart disease.

"Having a family member to have these problems only makes me more aware of my lifestyle. If you had a close person to die in a car accident, you would be more willing to wear a seatbelt. I am more willing to pay close attention to what I need to do to stay healthy," Banks said.

Michelle Mann, assistant director for Health and Counseling Services at Winthrop, attributes heart disease to our daily activities.

"A lot of factors of heart disease are related to lifestyle-things we do, such as not exercising, bad eating habits and extremely high stress.

On various college campuses, many students are sexually active. Sadly, some of these young people put themselves at risk of contracting an Sexually Transmitted Infection, (STI) formally know as Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STD) by having unprotected sex. Michelle Mann, assistant director of Health and Counseling Services said, "Anybody having oral, genital, or anal sex is at risk."

There are various STI's. Herpes is a common STI caused by a virus that is spread thru physical contact during vaginal, anal, and oral sex.

Another common STI is gonorrhea as known as GC, clap, drip or dose. It is spread from any sexual physical contact.

Syphilis also known as syph, box, or bad blood is a prevalent STI among people. It is also contracted thru any sexual contact. Persons with syphilis may notice small or large chancres or skin sores in the genital area that usually don't hurt.

Another growing STI, chlamydia is a bacteria caused vaginal, anal, or oral sex. It is the most common STI



and the U.S. and the most reported cases of the bacteria come from the south.

Lastly, HIV, the virus that causes AIDS (Aquired Immune Deficiency Syndome), quickly invades-the young population. HIV can be passed during sex or sharing needles thru blood, semen, or vaginal fluids. There are virtually no symptoms with HIV. Symptom such as fatigue, loss or hair and skin discoloration come with AIDS.

STI's are a major health concern. There are students on campus with STI's such as chlamydia, HPV, syphilis, gonorrhea, and HIV, said Mann. "Students come to Crawford requesting information on STI's as well as info

THROUGH THE RAIN AND AFTER THE STORM: Dealing with depression and suicide

School, family and relationships are just a few of the many stressful factors that college students have to deal with on a regular basis. Unfortunately, many students who feel that they can no longer handle all of the stress of college life decide to take their own lives.

According to medicalnewsservice.com, suicide is the second leading cause of death among college students.

Ramona Alston, a 20-year-old psychology major from McClellanville, S.C., said, "I don't know of anyone who hasn't been stressed at one point and time, but I believe that the people who don't have something to balance the stress will be more likely to attempt suicide."

Kwabena Sankofa, a psychologist in the stu-

dent health center at Winthrop, explains that there are three different types of cases involving suicide.

Sankofa said the first type of case concerning suicide is "suicidal ideation." These are simply

suicidal thoughts. These people have no intention of committing suicide but the thought often crosses their minds. Dr. Sankofa said that these cases occur most frequently. Next, there

are the people who actually attempt suicide. These people had previously attempted suicide but did not succeed in killing themselves.

Finally, there is the case of suicide completion.

These people actually succeed in killing themselves

Sankofa said that 70 percent of the people who come in to counseling at Winthrop have suicidal thoughts. Twenty-five percent of the people

> who come in have actually attempted suicide.

Students, professor protest racists at NC rally

Three Winthrop students and a professor traveled to Raleigh, N.C. to convey a powerful message: they won't tolerate hate. This group, along with approximately 600 others protested a demonstration held by White supremacists belonging to the Ku Klux Klan and Neo-Nazi organizations in what was to be a recruitment rally.

The Feb. 21st downtown Raleigh demonstration was just one of the supremacist's' visits on a multi-southern state capital tour. Consisting of nearly 25 white supremacists wearing full Klan and Nazi garb, they were met with plenty of opposition. One protester was senior art major and Columbia, S.C. native Patrick Holt.

When asked what compelled him to go protest, Holt, 22, said he wanted to intimidate the supremacists, just the way they hope to intimidate the ones that they hate. While Holt admitted that it was "bizarre and scary" to see such individuals in today's society, he took pride in the fact that he and the other protesters halted their efforts. By making noises by banging on plastic buckets, screaming and chanting, they succeeded in preventing the attendance of any possible recruitees. According to Holt, "Basically, they were speaking to a bunch of people who were yelling at them."

The members of the North Carolina NAACP and the Black Student Union of N.C. State University organized the official demonstration.

To serve & protect or ignore & murder?

Many African-American males experience unfair treatment from law enforcement officials at least once in their lifetime. The senseless tragedies of arresting and even beatings are becoming too common in this country.

An innocent, unarmed African-American male by the name of Kenneth Walker was brutally beaten and murdered by law enforcement in Columbus, Georgia.

The local sheriffs special unit targeted four black males riding in a high-priced SUV as "possible drug suspects." Each individual detained by sheriffs were college graduates as well as responsible citizens within the community.

The four men were forcefully dragged from their expensive SUV at gunpoint. They were then demanded to lie on a major interstate like criminals.

Soon after forcing the men to lie on the ground. One of the "trigger happy" officers made what some feel was an unconscious decision to shoot Kenneth Walker in the front of the head twice with an H&K MPS assault rifle.

The Barbarian, who shot Walker, claimed that he made a "personal judgment call." He further stated that he couldn't see Walker's right hand.

While Walker lie dying on

the side of the road, the officers understanding full well now that they had targeted the wrong vehicle still arrested the other 3 gentlemen.

Walker was shot at 9:00pm Wednesday evening, yet his family was not notified until 1:00am Tuesday morning. The family missed their opportunity to say their farewells due to the fact Walker died before they arrived at the hospital.

Walker was considered a loving husband, devoted father, and a responsible, civic-oriented individual, who was very involved with the community. He was also a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated. Not only had Walker never been in trouble with the law, but also there wasn't even a speeding ticket on his record.

Upon their strict search, the sheriffs found no guns or contraband in the vehicle. Approximately 6 hours later, the gentlemen were finally released. To add insult to injustice, the local government officials are currently stonewalling this situation.


The entire incident was caught on tape, but the sheriffs department is refusing to release the tape, which is a matter of public record under the "Freedom of Information" Act.

Sam Gilchrist, a junior at Trident Technical College says, "I don't think that an officer beating on a person is reasonable in this case. I mean, they are trained professionals and they should be following strict procedures in order to prevent such Ottis Allen, an assistant manager at Footaction said, " I feel that if an officer wrongly harms someone, they should have to deal with the same consequences as a criminal. Most law enforcement officials feel as though they are above the

actions."

The bottom line here is that if you are a young black male in this country, your life could be subject to come down to a "judgment call" by a "so-called" officer of the law.





Much to gay and lesbian marriage advocate's' dismay, Bush is opposing any amendments being applied to standing legislation that would call for so-called marriage equality.





If you remember the television show "Family Matters," you auto-


matically think of the main characters Steve Urkel and Laura Winslow, but do you remember

for her emotionally unstable best



Haitian Uprising: Decade-long revolt in Haiti continues

Freedom, Societies Rights, and the need for the resigning of an authoritarian President! At any given time you can see the necessity of people in the streets of Haiti to convey a message to have their way. Haiti has been oppressed for a long time, however, in the 21st century the people of Haiti have lashed out and have gained the attention of the entire world on their country. Yet, these people have a mission to have President Jean Bertrand Aristide successfully ousted from

office. A CNN Correspondent, Lucia Newman, described the situation in Port-au-Prince, the capital of Haiti as "anarchy." She also said "Armed gangs, thugs, are ransacking, patrolling the streets at will, and there are no police to be seen. The U.S. Embassy issued a statement saying that pro-government popular organizations in Port-au-Prince have begun to burn, pillage and kill."

It began in 1990 when Aristide, a former priest became Haiti's first democratically elected president. According to MSNBC, an article stated "Haitian police attack on rebels in slum" which grabbed my

> attention. It reported that an uprising paralyzed parts of the country where over 40 people were killed. It was then when I learned this social conflict had been stirring since September of 2003. However, the public of the

United States was introduced to it in February 2004.

Over and over I have read that the main problem with the people of Haiti and their reason for uprising is their cry for the President to resign. According to the Toronto Star by, Reed Lindsay In an impromptu news conference held in a dirt-floored structure made of corrugated tin and wooden planks, rebel leader Butteur Metayer demanded that Haitian President Jean-Bertrand Aristide resign or face new attacks in the cities of St. Marc, Cap-Haitian and eventually Port-au-Prince, the capital. 'What we're doing right now, it will happen all over the country. It hasn't started yet, but it will soon,' said Metayer, a stout bald man wearing sunglasses and a blue Nike shirt, flanked by a dozen stone-faced men brandishing a hodgepodge of aging firearms, including AK-47s, M-16s and at least one Uzi." That report was in early February.

But did you know that the U.S. government has been interfering in the politics of Haiti for sometime. What is our reason for helping a President that the people want out? The U.S. Embassy issued a statement

saying that "pro-government popular organi-



zations in Port-au-Prince have begun to burn, pillage and kill." Secretary of State Collin Powell said, "[we] must reach out to the opposition, to make sure that thugs are not allowed to break up peaceful demonstrations."

Powell met with OAS members in Washington on Friday and said they agreed the United States would accept no outcome that, in any way, attempts to remove the elected president of Haiti. The United States sent 20,000 troops to Haiti in 1994 to restore Aristide, end a bloody military dictatorship and halt an exodus of refugees to Florida. Washington says it plans no new military intervention in the Caribbean country, where discontent has grown among the 8 million people since Aristide's party swept flawed legislative elections in 2000 and international donors froze millions of dollars in aid.





All across the United States and the world, the HIV/AIDS epidemic is spreading at a very rapid rate. According to a website by the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, as of the end of 2003, an estimated 40 million people worldwide - 37 million adults and 2.5 million children younger than 15 years - were living with HIV/AIDS. work and low grades may explain why some students feel like they have to end their lives.

Sankofa said that suicide is ultimately the result of severe hopelessness and that suicide occurs when people feel that no one cares about them. They tend to magnify their problems and they have no one to talk to about them.

About 20 students per week seek counseling at Winthrop's student health center. Of those weekly patients, Sankofa said that 60 percent of them suffer from depression, 30 percent suffer from anxiety, and 10 percent suffer from concern over new adjustments in their lives, such as death or school.

Relationship problems are often responsible for a large part of the depression. Relationship problems can be anything from a fight with a significant other, friend or family member. Severe levels of depression are the cause for most suicide cases.

Sankofa said a lot of students who seriously consider suicide do not realize how final it is. They see death as a quick fix to their problems at the time.

Laura Howard, resident director of Lee Wicker Hall, said people who think about suicide

have lost all hope and do not have a realistic view of death. Howard says that they don't understand that there is no coming back from death.

Sankofa gave some warning signs to help determine whether or not you or someone you love may be suicidal. These warning signs include: a sad demeanor, withdrawal from friends and family/isolation, not sleeping well at night or sleeping a lot during the day, loss of appetite, lack of energy, and lack of interest in activities that were once enjoyed.

In order to help someone who has suicidal tendencies, Sankofa advises that, as a friend, you help to

get them involved in some type of activity. It is also important for them to have some type of leadership role in that activity because by having a leadership role, the person feels important and needed. He continues by saying that it is important to get them involved in something that they enjoy in order to energize them.

If you or someone you know is suffering from depression and/or considering suicide, it is important that you or that person seek professional help immediately before it is too late.

"I stepped up to the plate and became more responsible to think about him first and not myself," Moore said.




While in school, McCrea communicates with her daughter on a regular basis.
