**CITY TAX ASSESSORS**

The city board of tax assessors have finished their first run, so to speak. They have mailed out cards to the various taxpayers written in red ink by the way, informing them that their assessments have been raised.

Well, you all know that if you want to see a guy "sweat blood" all you have to do is to raise his taxes. A tax-dodger will beat taxes and do it with a clear conscience—beg pardon apparently with a clear conscience. Yes, a man will cheat the church, attend services regularly, gradually sliding from the back seat to the Amen corner, where he adopts a "free from sin" air and still ease out of paying his proportion of the taxes which makes this country a decent place in which to reside. A tax-dodger likes a peacable neighborhood, good schools, good roads, etc., but he wants the other fellow to pay 'em all.

Of course, it is not the business of the News to fight the battle of the city tax assessors. It is the citizens on the job took it at the solicitation of the Mayor and we assume they are able to take care of themselves. However, there is no doubt that they have made mistakes. They have put some assessments too high but those who have been assessed too high have the opportunity of appealing, and if those who appeal will make a detailed statement of the amount of property they have on hand we fall to see how any board of assessors can do other than put the property on an equitable basis. So why pull your hair. Make a sworn statement and then if you are not properly assessed raise Cain.

But here's the thing: Some people have been healthy taxes every time they made their first tax return and because they have been put on an equitable basis as they are certain "assing and sooting. That kind of a guy makes us sick. The proper way to treat such a fellow would be to make him pay the back taxes he has "fringed" the county and town out of for the past century.

The assessment of property for taxation is a big question but it needs to be equalized and has been needing equalization for many years. We don't like the way South Carolina is going at the proposition but we suppose it is necessary to start somewhere, so why not start in the town. When it comes to the assessment of taxable property, North Carolina has the Palmetto State beat a mile and possibly our legislature will make some time and follow in the foot steps of our neighboring State.

**OUR TOWNS AND COUNTIES.**

Have you ever thought about the efficiency of our county and also our city government? The more you study about it the more you believe that it is the most inefficient, pretentious business proposition on the top side of the globe. We would almost make a bet that the devil has a more efficient system of punishing earthly visitors than the average county or town has of running a government "of the people, by the people and for the people."

Now for instance, Can you find one lota of efficiency in the manner of selecting county officials? We don't mean to be personal at all "cause Chester county has some mighty fine officials, but the amount of our efficient system in securing them but the Good Lord has just taken care of us along this line. You know they say "He looks after the fool."

A man after hours of deliberation, which covers loss of sleep, etc., decides to enter the race for some office. Over the county ramparts he goes, shaking hands and kissing babies, telling his horns and so on. Yes, he's a good fellow and becomes popular with the people and is elected to some office. He knows just about as much about the office as a two-year-old baby knows about an automobile. He just loves to hear the knock of the horn. Some officials learn their

duties after being elected but the majority start to "discollecting" the day after they are elected. Duty calls and a vote looks him in the face. He tells duty to go to Germany or some other yarm country and add vote has everything going his way. And we wonder why taxes are so high.

Efficiency is a great fat reducer but he just won't accept a public office. However, they say, "every dog has his day" but old efficiency may be the last dog.

And these towns, burse some people call them. They, the people, elect or select a Mayor and a whole room full of aldermen, whose duty apparently is to play to the grand stand. The average alderman has about as much backbone as a grass-hopper. The salary he gets makes him that way. He's almost afraid to attend a council meeting for fear he'll dare something which will offend some "influential" citizen. And what do they do after they get to a meeting? Some councilman has something to "put over" and he makes a motion, which is seconded, and the way it goes, every fellow afraid to apply the brakes, cause it might offend a fellow councilman. Yes, a great many of the motions and seconds there, are all arranged before the Honorable body enters the council chamber. That's how "cut and dried" got to be a phrase.

The Mayor makes his big killing when he makes the annual appointment of chairman of this and that committee. That calls for shrewdness. The idea is to put every councilman where he will get the most benefit, financial or otherwise, and this being done they stick to the Mayor through thick and thin. It's a great crime, but Moses how the public has to suffer. Efficiency is a great thing but it's mighty hard to make an alderman of it.

Another great stain in city affairs is "passing the buck." Mr. Jerry Jones Jacob, an influential person, makes a request of the city council pertaining, say to the street department. The matter is brought up in the council and Councilman Shifter makes a motion to refer it to the street committee. This motion is seconded by Shifter, Jr., and the street committee forgets all about it. No the job of councilman does not carry a remunerative salary

along with it and who the dickens wants to fall about with an "influential citizen" about nothing.

There's one thing that every citizen, no matter how rich or how poor, how ugly or how handsome, has to do—that's die, but they all want to live just as long as possible. Years ago somebody started what they called a health department the prime object being to assist the citizens to live longer, and most towns are evidently of the opinion that anybody; farmer, carpenter, shoe-maker, aviator or what not, is competent to keep the people living until they are three score years and ten; Wonder what a logician would think of that? If you had the cramp colic and a cemetery was looking you square in the face, would you send for a brick-mason? No, you would send for a physician and darn quick too. We have often wondered why towns do not send for "healthicians" to keep the people healthy.





### TOO HORRIBLE TO REPEAT

Our letter to the President, demanding investigation and punishment for crimes committed by the Germans as a nation and as individuals, was written after our party had spent several days motoring along the devastated front, witnessing the unavoidable destruction as a result of so great a conflict, as well as the evident vandalism and wanton destruction of unimportant personal property, art treasures, cathedrals and homes. To this was added at every inquiry the stories of barbarities, torture and the violation and mutilation of women and children too horrible to repeat and too frequent to plead exception. Even in the record of barbarous and uncivilized nations fighting from selfishness and greed, history does not record such vital violations of the rules of warfare. The barbarians fought under uniform practice; the Huns fought a war of sackings among civilized nations. The innocent blood of Belgium and France, as well as the suffering of starving prisoners held in Germany, try out for justice. In all modern civilization, the one factor that holds the lawbreaker in check is the certainty of punishment for crimes committed. To leave unpunished the crimes committed in the late war is to destroy the only safeguard to a future peace among nations.

It was in the midst of these demonstrations, these violations if every law of modern warfare, that we were stirred to demand as American citizens that the first step to a universal peace shall be the trial, conviction and punishment of crimes committed outside and beyond the crime of bringing a devastating war among the civilized nations. That such justice shall be exacted, that a universal peace is untimely, unoperative and incoherent. The civilization of this country, guaranteeing the equal rights of citizens to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, would long since have given place to anarchy by the right to inflict punishment for crime. No other principle can be maintained in a peace propaganda among nations, and never should be considered until this first principle has become the foundation and such action taken as will seal into history the acts which will guarantee to posterity the right of nations to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. 


