The fire fighters suffered for lack of pressure being due to the fact that the engine was confined to a four inch main Lewis street, which was too small for the engine to work efficiently. For some time it was feared that the fire was going to spread to Saluda street residences but a calm night saved the homes and the loss was confined as above mentioned.

The theatres are required to pay a federal tax based on the seating capacity of their houses and in addition to that the federal government requires that they collect ten per cent of the admission fee from the patrons. The South Carolina law now calls for an additional tax of ten per cent on admissions and the theatres claim that this additional tax is going to put them out of business. Already the number of moving picture houses in South Carolina has decreased about forty per cent in the past three years, they claim, that they cannot afford to pay the higher taxes being required on their business.

SHOOTING ON MAIN STREET.
Dr. W. C. Twitty, of Rock Hill, opened fire on DeWitt C. Johnson, on Main Street of Rock Hill yesterday morning.

The following article is from the Rock Hill Herald of yesterday afternoon:

An unfortunate shooting affray occurred in front of the post office shortly before noon today when Dr. W. C. Twitty opened fire from a 32 pistol on DeWitt C. Johnson. Fortunately the shots struck wide of their aim and nobody suffered bodily injury.

According to witnesses interviewed it appears that Dr. Twitty, who is supposed to have been in the post office at the time, met at the post office this morning. About half an hour prior to the shooting Dr. Twitty took watch of the post office surroundings from across the street.

Dr. Twitty immediately approached the couple and as soon as Mr. Johnson observed him the latter started to run. Dr. Twitty fired three shots, which Mr. Johnson was making his escape in the rear of the Rodney Reid garage but none of the shots took effect.

Dr. Twitty immediately surrendered his weapon and was taken to the post office by Chief of Police Youngblood. He will be given a hearing before the city court this week; the date for said hearing not being set owing to the absence of Recorder Watson from the city today.
