Well Known Darlington Farmer Gives Results of Some Interesting Experiments. He Has Been Making "Ade's" Tests of Advantage of Delinted Seed. N. L. Willet in News and Courier. An illuminating pamphlet, which comes very near to the pocket book of every cotton farmer, is before me, the author being Mr. Bright Williamson, of Darlington, S. C., who is one of the most intelligent and progressive farmers in South Carolina. It relates to the comparative value of the close spacing of cotton and the planting of delinted seed. What Mr. Williamson herein says has been said for years by our national agricultural department but these publications, seemingly, have had no effect on agriculture. Mr. Williamson's pamphlet is being widely distributed. It is to be hoped that his conclusions will find credence among our farmers.

Mr. Williamson says that by not having followed his pamphlet rules that he has lost in the past twenty years \$20,000 of his investment. Mr. Williamson's losses, however, are a fact, the loss of every farmer who is willing to grow cotton close and plant with unweeded seed. Mr. Williamson has been growing it. Close spacing of cotton is sometimes called "the hedge row fashion. In it you get less cotton per plant but you get more stalks to the acre and far quicker bolls. Mr. Williamson heretofore has been working on the principle of the well developed plant that is full of limbs and full of foliage. In order to produce all of this mass the plant must work slowly. Close spacing

eliminates limbs and foliage and the main stem with its fruit on it is quickly developed. What farmer figures went into limbs and foliage works with accelerated motion on main stem and bolls. Scientifically, the principle of delinted seed is to get however, pre-supposes fairly rich lands; and, in fact, no farmer should attempt to grow cotton these days on poor soil. Let the farmer figure out how many more plants he will grow per acre as planted one foot in the row and with three-foot rows and when planted two feet in the row in four-foot rows.

Mr. Williamson's Figures. Here are the results of Mr. Williamson's experiments this past year: Three-foot rows, one foot in drill 1,446 pounds seed cotton. Three and one-half foot rows, one foot in drill 1,801 pounds seed cotton. Four-foot rows, one foot in drill 1,161 pounds seed cotton. Four and one-half foot rows, one foot in drill 1,111 pounds seed cotton.

Five-foot rows—one foot in drill 1,022 pounds seed cotton. It will be seen that the yields are almost in exact proportion to the thicker spacing of the plant.

Thinking Out. A vast amount of labor every year goes into thinning out. Mr. Williamson found out that two stalks to the hill could be left without any disadvantage and he found that where germination was not too excessive that cotton need not be thinned at all. All of this is revolutionary and agriculture has up to this day refused to follow close spacing. It has been shown that planters who have been losing just by Mr. Williamson has been losing. Mr. Williamson's research work on delinted seeds tallies exactly exactly with the government. Here are his results. All seed sown planted May 2. On May 7 delinted seed showed 100 per cent stand, while normal seed showed that none of all sown germinated. May 14 showed delinted seed 100 per cent stand and normal seed ground just beginning to crack. May 21 showed delinted seed 85 per cent stand. There was here nearly two weeks of com-

parative lateness on the part of normal undelinted seed and there was little more than one-half of proper germination. Another year this ought to throw a great deal of delinted seed on the market. I know of no commercial delinted seed on the market except Salisbury cotton, which is being put on the market today as the type of cotton which for earliness and productivity will be the future cotton under boll weevil conditions. I get so many letters asking the formulae as regards molasses and water mixtures that I give below those formulae as used by leading adherents of this process.

Dr. W. B. Taylor, of Dexter Ga., uses: Three pounds of calcium arsenate, one gallon of syrup, four gallons of water. It issues a pamphlet. Mr. D. H. Coker, of Hartsville, S. C., also issues a pamphlet and he uses: One pound of calcium arsenate, one gallon of syrup, one gallon of water.

Walker Bros., of Griffin, Ga., too frequently quoted and they use: Three pounds of calcium arsenate, one gallon of syrup, nine gallons of water. This would seem to be made for a system of general sprinkling. Mr. Herbert, of Commerce, Ga., has been largely quoted, too, and his formula is: Three pounds of calcium arsenate, one and one-half gallons of syrup, three and one-half gallons of water. We see that there is no standard in the molasses mixture and that the individual farmer, will have to make his selection according to his own mind in the matter.

The molasses method has been used principally for poisoning the bud. The amount is put into a bucket and a small amount of it is dabbed upon the bud through the use of a mop on the end of a three-foot stick.
