They know that by appealing to the public by advertising, they can swing these big lots and turn them into money in a short time. Thus buy-ing is a law way and taking advantages of spec-al opportunities, they are able to offer special values.

Advertising increases volume of trade, thus re-tacing the operating and overhead expense per tricle, making it possible to set prices to the pub-ic. The advertised store buy, and operates at low igures, and can thus make low prices.
