Sales Tax Bill Dies Quick.

The proposed sales tax bill of the South Carolina General Assembly passed quickly last Friday when scores of merchants from various sections of South Carolina, including several from Chester, pointed down on Columbia protesting on all sides against the sales tax.

This leaves the legislature without available means of securing money to foot the bill as proposed in the appropriation bill. Suggestions have been made that the appropriation bill be reduced but no talk does not get very far in the legislature.

Many say of the opinion that the state levy will be raised in order to provide the necessary revenue to cover the appropriation bill.
