Supply Measure Passed.

The State supply measure bill passed the senate and the house of representatives yesterday and will go to Governor Richards for his signature or veto.

The measure, as passed eliminates the proposed tax on sugar fruit jars and bays. The measure provides for a three per cent. increase in the tax on more than five mills.

The measure will lack approximately a million dollars of covering the appropriation. The bill included an item of \$24,000 for overtime pay for members of the general assembly.

FARM COUNCIL MEET

Excellent Meeting of Farm Council. Last Night at A. B. P. Church—D. W. Watkins Makes Forceful Talk to Assembly—Miss Landrum Also Makes Fine Talk—Banquet Greatly Enjoyed.

Declaring that "through community organization Chester County needs to tackle the fundamental question of production of enough food products for home needs" and quoting some striking figures bearing on Chester County, Mr. D. W. Watkins, in a forceful and convincing talk last evening at the A. B. P. Church before the Chester County Farm Council, went right to the bottom of the question of a more prosperous agriculture.

"Chester County needs 3500,000 annually for fertilizer," declared Mr. Watkins, "and spends untold thousands for food and feed products that should be raised in the county." Quoting from 1925 and 1927 census figures he showed that for the month of the county alone sends from the matter of the production of a surplus for market, the county is short 300,000 bushels of wheat, 220,500 lbs. 350,000 dozens of eggs, 338,398 bushels of corn, 325,400 bushels of oats, 8,569 tons of hay, 12,000 bushels of apples, 5,000 bushels of peaches, 3000 bushels of pears, 1743 additional acres in high gardens.

Mr. Watkins repeatedly remarked that the past is a matter of history but the future requires a complete change in methods if the agriculture of the county is to progress.

To this end he emphasized the community organization as the most effective and "quick means of bringing about this result."

Miss Donnie Landrum, director of home demonstration work in South Carolina, gave a very definite and clear cut way in which farm women could be a vital force in the success of the community club.

"Without the inspiring influence of neighborliness, community pride, community spirit, all that is attractive in community life is lost," remarked Miss Landrum and "the farm women have a great work to perform in making community life more attractive," she declared. She mentioned as projects, the health of the community, the enhancement of its beauty by landscaping the school, church and home grounds through community effort, the introduction of labor-saving devices in the home, beautifying the inside of the home, planning of road gardens, libraries for the community school, equipping the school grounds with healthful playground equipment. She recommended community recreational activities in the community, community orchestras and musicals and many other ways in which the community might be improved.

There were 41 present comprising members of the Agricultural Council and their wives from all of the several communities in the county. Several business men of the city were also present. Following several other short talks by representatives of the already organized communities the meeting adjourned with an expression from several representatives that it was their determination to carry on with the community organization idea.
