LIKE NEW LAW

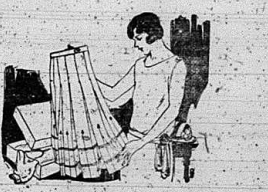
Many people are expressing themselves as favoring the new law which imposes a maximum and minimum sentence on prisoners. The defendant has to serve the minimum sentence that the court imposes but as to whether or not he serves the maximum sentence depends upon his conduct while in the county jail, penitentiary or on the chain gang. The state board of pardons has charge of this feature and they decide at the expiration of the minimum sentence whether or not the convict warrants his freedom or the serving of the maximum sentence. The superior of each county will keep a detailed record of each prisoner and will make an annual report to the pardon board as to his conduct and this will determine whether or not he will have to serve the maximum or the minimum sentence. In this manner each prisoner will be encouraged to behave himself while serving his sentence.

CHESTER BOY WINS

William Culp of Chester High School, Was First Place in Contest in Columbia last Saturday. Will go to Nashville May first.

William Culp, age fifteen, a member of the 1925 class at the Chester High school will represent South Carolina in the South-eastern some finals of the national oratorical contest on the federal constitution, in Nashville, Tenn., on May first. He won this honor, along with a cash prize of \$200 toward a college course, in a tournament with six other students, each representing a congressional district in the State finals, held Saturday in Columbia, with Governor McLeod presiding.

When Thomas Jefferson drafted the Declaration of Independence, there came into use our present national flag. The United States of America, but as the Constitution of the United States was adopted did our official title more than slightly change. Before the union of the states was very inexact, Congress was nearly, if not wholly powerless, and the confederation never held another such important assembly in the history of the human race. The purpose of this meeting was to amend the old articles of confederation; but so many changes were found necessary that it was decided to frame an entirely new constitution.

On account of the different views taken by members many obstacles had to be overcome. Compromises of all kinds had to be made; many times it was wholly impossible for the convention to agree, and it was on one such occasion that a member suggested opening all succeeding meetings with prayer for divine aid.

Former York Sheriff Dead.

High G. Brown, 60 years of age, a former sheriff and supervisor of York county, died at his home four miles north of York, Friday following a long period of failing health.

Mr. Brown was sheriff of York county for 12 years, retiring from that office of his own volition. He afterwards was elected county supervisor and during his second term in this capacity suffered such a failure in health as to necessitate his resignation, which took place about two years ago.

Both as sheriff and as supervisor Mr. Brown rendered York county efficient, faithful and conscientious services, always performing his duty as he saw it, regardless of consequences. He was well known throughout York county and his death brings regret to his hundreds of friends.

Surviving are his widow and eight children.

Chaataqua Tent Located.

A meeting of the Redpath Chaataqua guarantors was held at the Court House yesterday afternoon, about fifty being present.

The first matter to come up was the location of the tent for this year. It was unanimously decided to place the tent on the Community lot on the corner of Centre and McAllister streets, which is the same location as used last year.

The matter of whether or not to have reserved seats was taken up and by a vote of 24 to 20 it was again decided to sit reserved seats.

It was said that Chester and South Bend, Indiana are the only two towns on the Chaataqua circuit which sell reserved seats.

Mr. O. H. Embury, advance man for the Chaataqua was present and told of the program this year, which is said to be the best in the past several years.

Reserved seats will be placed at sale at the Court House Friday morning at eight-thirty o'clock.

Those who go to the Court House will be given numbers, the first arriving to be given choice of the seats.

Contest At High School Friday.

There will be a contest in expression and a contest in declamation at the High School on Columbia street Friday evening at eight o'clock, participated in by the following six schools: Chester, Edgemore, Fort Lawn, Great Falls, Oakley Hall, and Richburg.

Dr. J. P. Kinard, Prof. W. K. Maginnis, and third Western College teacher will be the judges. Medals have been ordered, and will be awarded winners of first and second place in each event.

Superintendent M. E. Brockman agreed not to enter his first and second place winners, and Superintendent E. H. Hall, of Great Falls, agreed to rule out his first-place winner.

This is expected to prove a most interesting occasion, and it is hoped that it will develop into an annual event.

"Granny" Batchford Dead.

Probably the oldest resident of York county and its only known centenarian, Mrs. Mary "Granny" Batchford, 100 years and 26 days of age, died suddenly at 9 o'clock Saturday morning at her home in York county, two miles from Belmore, N. C.

Mrs. Batchford has suffered an attack of pneumonia some time ago, but it was believed that she had recovered without ill effects. She celebrated her 100th birthday March 28, an occasion for many congratulations and many visitors to her home, where she lived with her only surviving son, Burton Batchford, said to be nearing his three score and ten.

Mrs. Batchford was the daughter of Dr. J. C. Hutto of the Carolina Sporting Goods Company of Charlotte, which will be awarded to the team winning the highest number of points. Among the schools which have entered are Chester and Great Falls.

Pond Opens Next Thursday

Pension Funds Soon Available.

Confederate pension funds amounting to \$744,114 will be distributed by the comptroller general's office on or about May 1 as a result of the 5,000,000 loan recently negotiated by the state, according to Comptroller General A. J. Beattie. The funds will be divided among the counties on the basis of the number of pensioners in each.

This year the number of widows of Confederate veterans far exceeds that of the veterans themselves. There are 4,056 widows of veterans, while there are only 2,625 veterans remaining who will receive pensions.

BUSINESS MAN NEEDED

Popular opinion on South Carolina is crystallizing into a sentiment for reductions in State expenditures, but the majority of people wish to maintain most of the existing departments and institutions owned or controlled by the government.

The answer is that the members of the Legislature who have no means of securing intimate knowledge of the various departments and institutions - sharing in the budget, and by the respective heads of departments and institutions. The budget commission is headed by the Governor, and is composed of other State officers. Their duty is to prepare the budget. The Governor, as the director of the commission, receives requests from each department and either recommends that they be granted or that they be cancelled. But due to the fact that he has not been in Columbia, and that he is engaged in other activities than that of certifying the appropriation, even the most diligent possess the knowledge of conditions in each department that an official charged with such a duty should have.

It might not be desirable to appoint a full-time high caliber business man, who could make exhaustive investigations of every agency of the government and determine just what money they should be expending? Many of the State departments are directed not by business men, but by scientists and educators who naturally lack the enthusiasm for their work, that the most desired and is the obtaining of more money. In their zeal they extend their activities at every opportunity, and present to the Legislature such a vast amount of money that they need that the appropriation bill show larger every year.

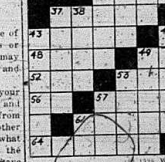
