**TELL 'EM ABOUT IT**  
 Says a recent issue of The  
 Marion Star:

In this issue of the Star we set  
 the views of two county par-  
 ties, both plainly opposed to the  
 highway department, "as  
 constituted." This is done,  
 more than for any other reason,  
 to show their opposition to the  
 policy of that department is  
 confined solely to Marion  
 county, nor the voicing of such  
 sentiments to this paper. The  
 "Standard" and the Lex-  
 ington "Dispatch" seem to be up  
 arms to a degree, and we con-  
 siderable them for their refusal  
 to swallow the sweet taming mor-  
 sal being fed to the people of  
 South Carolina by the "powers  
 that be" in the hope of knocking  
 out a cocked hat the desires of  
 the legislature in regard to the  
 highway department and retain-  
 ing Rhett, Moorfield and Co.,  
 kings of the highways. These  
 papers readily see that the duly  
 appointed highway commissioner,  
 with the authority of law at his  
 back, will be no more dreadful  
 to contemplate than the other  
 much, which has taken control  
 of the department, without con-  
 sultation, and who have it locked,  
 stockaded and barred against all  
 comers. "Favored legacies" are  
 the only ones under the present  
 regime, which have even a re-  
 mote chance for hard-surfaced  
 roads; that is a well known fact.  
 Marion County is not one of the  
 "favored" and therefore our  
 chance of ever getting a dollar's  
 worth of paved roads looks about  
 as bright as a gincham dress at  
 a presidential ball. We presume  
 that Selma and Lexington feel  
 the same way. And, there are  
 others; never fear, except they  
 have not discovered their own  
 condition as yet—fair promises  
 have bought their silence, but oh,  
 what a row is coming when those  
 promises fail to materialize. The  
 ravings and rantings of this pa-  
 per, which has never contemplated  
 seeing Marion County benefited  
 by a single nickel from the huge  
 paved-roads measure, will be mod-  
 est indeed to the yell which will  
 come from some of these fellows  
 who have been duped and put to  
 sleep with fair words. For per-  
 sistency in taking the Sugar-coat,  
 in allowing their minds to be  
 lulled by soft music and fair  
 promises, the people of this state win  
 all the trophies ever offered. That  
 we shall longer submit to be the  
 high-handed, unfair wild and  
 reckless control of the highway  
 department by Rhett, Moorfield  
 and Co., is unbelievable. To the  
 weekly papers of the state our  
 people must look for battle; the  
 great battles are in line, we wish  
 the highway officials, "as now con-  
 stituted," and if a reform is to  
 come it must come as a result of  
 a demand by the people, led by  
 the country press. And of whom  
 are we afraid?

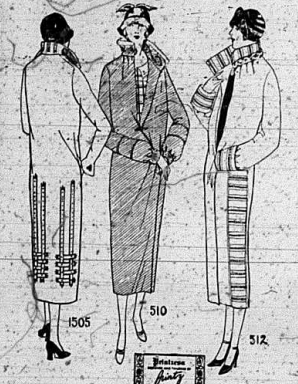
