SCHOLARSHIPS WERE ANNOUNCED BY COLUMBIANS

Methodist College For Girls Receives Two Funds of \$10,000 Each
Columbia, June 2.—Methodists of South Carolina will be interested in the announcement made at the closing exercises of Columbia college Tuesday, to the effect that two prominent Columbians have donated money for scholarship funds for the institution, each fund being for ten thousand dollars.
T. B. Stackhouse, prominent warehouse operator of the capital city, is one of the scholarship donors. This is to be an income loan fund and is to be known as the Sadie Stackhouse Hawkins scholarship, in memory of Mr. Stackhouse's only daughter, Mrs. Hawkins, who died in Columbia recently.
The other scholarship fund is established by a prominent druggist of Columbia, who asked that his name be not announced. The interest on this \$10,000 investment will be used for two scholarships.
Another announcement made at the commencement exercise was to the effect that W. P. Harris of Gray Court, in Laurens county, and his family, had donated a nucleus of a fund, in honor of W. P. Harris.

400 PER CENT DIVIDEND DECLARED BY S. C. MILLS

Stockholders Vote for Largest Return Ever Paid by Cotton Mill in the South
Spartanburg, S. C., June 1.—In man mills, of which K. A. Chapman is president and treasurer, have decided on a stock dividend of 400 per cent, 300 per cent to be in the common stock and 100 per cent in preferred.
This is the largest stock dividend that has yet been paid by any southern cotton mill. The present capitalization is \$300,000.
Announcement was also made this morning that directors of the Marion, N. C., mills of which D. D. Little of this city is president and treasurer, have declared a cash dividend of 60 per cent payable at once.
Stockholders of the Baxton mills met today and ratified the action of the directors in declaring a stock dividend of 200 per cent.
Stockholders of Clifton mill also met today and ratified the action of their directors in declaring a stock dividend of 100 per cent. This will also pay a cash dividend of 10 per cent.




