LEXINGTON SHERIFF MAKES BANNER HAUL
Forty-nine Gallons of Georgia Dew, Three Men and Touring Car Captured.
Lexington, June 4.—What is believed to have been the largest seizure of contraband whiskey ever made in the history of Lexington country, was made late Thursday evening by Sheriff Sim J. Miller when he captured 49 gallons of Georgia mountain dew, three men and a big touring car. The capture and seizure was made on the Augusta highway about a mile south of Lexington. In some way Sheriff Miller learned that an automobile loaded toward Lexington was loaded with whiskey, and he made his stand on the roadway, placing his own automobile across the road, making it impossible for the whiskey laden machine to get by. The entire party were taken into custody. The men, liquor and automobile were brought to Lexington. Two of the men are white. They gave their names as E. B. Jackson and J. F. Hammond. The negro, who was driving the car, gave his name as Will Collins. All of them claim to be from Savannah, and were en route to a point beyond Columbia, where they claim the whiskey was to be delivered to a Columbia man. The lot of liquor was contained in one 15, three 10 and four other gallon jugs. The machine seized was a practically new touring car. The prisoners will be held for the state courts for trial before being turned over to federal authorities.

WILSON FLAYS CONGRESS FOR FAILURE TO REDUCE THE HIGH COST OF LIVING
And He Calls to See Where Much It to Be Gained With Congress Still in Session.
Washington, June 5.—Congress was charged today by President Wilson with failure to take "important remedial action with respect to the cost of living," and to give "serious consideration" to the revision of the tax laws and the problems of peace.
Telegraphing to the heads of the 18 railroad brotherhoods several hours before the start of the session, the President said:
"It must be evident to all that the dominating motive which has actuated this Congress is political expediency rather than lofty purpose to serve the public welfare."
The President's message was in reply to one from the brotherhood officials protesting against the adjournment of Congress. Mr. Wilson said that "in the light of the record of the present Congress I have no reason whatever to hope that its continuance in session would result in constructive measures for the relief of the economic conditions to which you call attention."
The President added that "the protracted delay in dealing with the problem of the government owned merchant marine and other similar urgent matters has resulted in unnecessary burdens upon the public and ultimately in legislation so unsatisfactory that I could accept it if at all, only because I despaired of anything better."

LIBERTY BONDS ONLY STOCKS THAT SHOWED STRENGTH IN MARKET
New York, June 5.—Influenced mainly by further limitations imposed upon unessential credits, the stock market this week established a low record for dullness thus far this year. This did not apply to bonds. Liberty issues showing moderate activity at the expense of quoted values.
The political situation was among the deterrent factors, commission houses attributing much of the curtailment of operations, especially by the public, to uncertainty regarding the outcome of next week's developments at Chicago.
Local money conditions were unchanged, except for a further reduction of brokers' loans. Branch institutions, north, east and west followed the lead of the New York Federal Reserve bank in advancing their counts and the general money market was firmer at almost every important center.
Chief of the encouraging events in the securities market was the firm to strong tone of railroad shares. Especial interest attached to repurchase by an international banking house of a large block of St. Louis & San Francisco railway bonds from the French government.
Freight congestion at leading railroad terminals made additional progress towards improvement, but much remains to be accomplished in that quarter, especially at principal points of the steel and iron industry.
Surface-wise the price cutting campaign seemed to lose some of its recent breadth. Reports from interior banks identified with important lines of manufacture suggested, however, that downward revision of inventories has become more general.

CHESTER SETS THE PACE

The following is from The Rock Hill Record of yesterday:

"Chester, we are informed, has an electric cooking rate of 4 cents per kilowatt and that there are one hundred or more stores in the town and that their bills do not run any higher than ours for, in fact no so much, as they have after the 'Boosters' went on. Some ladies from Rock Hill who visited Chester recently saw one of the electric ranges in operation and said it is the nicest, cleanest and most satisfactory ever used on the way of a cooking arrangement. No odor, no dirt, and that the range was automatic, and when it got to work it would 'rest off' itself. This is the proposition Rock Hill wants to get in behind now and have something worth while—while they are trying."

NEWSPRINT PRICES ARE NOT WARRANTED

Senate Committee, After Investigation, Recommends That Manufacturers Be Prosecuted.

Washington, June 5.—Holding that scarcity of newsprint has not yet been handicapped American newspapers, to be "more the result of artificial obstructions than of natural laws," the senate committee which investigated that the department of justice institute proceedings under the Sherman and Clayton acts against printer manufacturers.

Manufacturers were charged by the committee with "unjust, illegal and discriminatory practices." Present prices for newsprint paper were held by the committee to be excessive and unwarranted.

Other recommendations made by the committee include:

- Establishment of a federal newsprint board to supervise the manufacture and distribution of print paper.
- "The newsprint industry should maintain a reasonable price fall."
- Amendment of the Lever food control act to penalize profiteering in newsprint paper.
- Imposition of an excise tax of ten cents on Sunday newspapers weighing more than ten pounds per copy and to limit such editions to 80 pages until an adequate paper supply can be secured.
- Appropriation of \$100,000 for the purpose of experimenting with substitutes for wood pulp.
- Establishment of rate of one cent a pound on sheet print paper to any part of the country when sent by parcel post without increasing the present limit of 70 pounds provided under the postal regulations.

The committee also recommended that consideration be given by the government to the establishments of a newsprint paper mill to supply the government's needs, with any surplus paper to be sold to small companies.

TELLS ABOUT WEEVILS

State Entomologist Explains Situation in Detail.

Clemson College, June 4.—Several statements have appeared in the press as to the damage being done at this time to the cotton plant from the boll weevil Professor Conrad, state entomologist, says that among the many insects sent in to his office for examination, a few were boll weevils and these from coastal counties. The majority were cowpea weevils. The cowpea weevil attacks young cotton before cowpeas are available, causing injury to cotton in spots. The remedy is to delay chopping until the damage has been done. The weevil is not over ten days or two weeks. While cotton in the bud, little damage is done in this manner. Serious damage to the cotton plant from boll weevil in season's favorable to the weevil comes after the squares are formed. This matter is under constant observation and there is no need for panic at this time. Statements will be made from time to time as to boll weevil development, according to W. W. Long, director of extension.

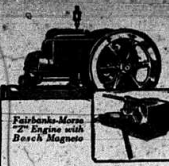

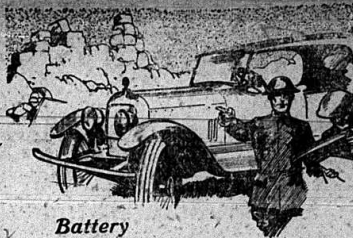

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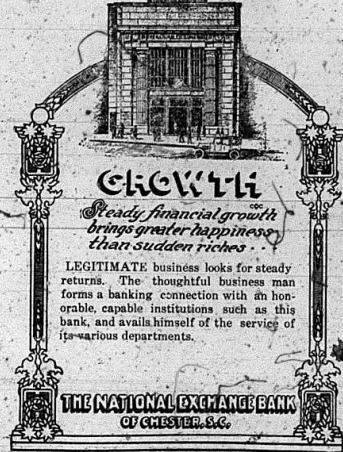
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
