#### Year Friend The Toad

A citizen of Chester was a few days ago telling The News about a "toad" who kept two fowls in his kitchen to catch flies. This citizen thought a great deal of the fowls and took particular pains to see that no one did harm to his "fly catchers."

That the toad is a friend to man is plainly shown in a recent issue of The Dearborn Independent and below you will find a few paragraphs taken from this publication with reference to the toad:

"Toads live for many years. There have been frequent examples of toads living in a garden for more than thirty years, and so great is the toad's instinct that if one picked up and carried away from its place of reg-

#### ular habitation it will, unless the distance is too great, promptly hop back when released. No cat or dog carrier pigeon has a greater homing instinct. It is believed by scientists who have studied the habits of toads that it always returns to the pond where it was hatched to mate, and that it also returns year after year to the same shelter and the same feeding ground.

While the toad is chiefly terrestrial it is often found near, and even in, shallow pools or streams. When it comes to eating, the toad is distinctly a creature of prey. Dead or motionless food holds no interest, but if the object of attack is moving the toad will set any insect it can swallow. The tongue is its instrument of attack, and this tongue is attached to the front of the mouth, and free behind. In this way it is flung forward, and the object of the attack is quickly carried back into the mouth

#### practically into the very throat.

The tongue of the toad is covered with a sticky coating, and this coating holds the insect fast. Sometimes when the insect is too large to be swallowed comfortably the toad will use the front feet as an aid to pushing it down its throat.

Another peculiarity of the toad is the fact that it sheds its coat several times a year. When it is time for the old coat to fall the toad goes on by itself, and if the skin does not peel off easily, it uses its front legs to hasten the operation. When the skin is off the toad frequently eats it.

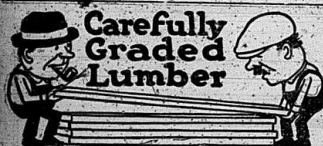
