Chester Merchants Take Steps To Stabilize Business

Merchants' Credit Association Goes Into Operation

"PAY-UP WEEK" Declared for June 22nd to July 2nd

Legitimate Credit Declared a Convenience—Its Abuse Leads to Higher Prices and Stagnant Business

Are you sixty days or more behind with your bills? Check up and see—perhaps you have a bill that has been overlooked, or you have simply forgotten to attend to it—these matters some times slip our minds. If you do find yourself behind drop in during pay-up week and settle your account. Let us clear the books of all bad accounts and start over with the slogan, "Pay Promptly."

The Merchants' Credit Association is not designed to eliminate credit, but to make it more workable and more safe. If your bill is sixty days or more past due, you will be notified accordingly. "Pay-Up-Week," Monday, June 22nd, until Thursday, July 2nd, is a time set apart for us to talk over these matters, pay all old accounts, if possible, or at least make some arrangements. If this isn't done we are duty bound to turn the bad accounts over to the Association, when they will be used by the members for their information in extending credit in the

future.

On and after July 2nd, all bills due and payable on the first of the month and which are not paid by the 10th of the month or some mutually satisfactory arrangement made with the merchant, will be listed with the Association.

Credit is a convenience—it is a courtesy the merchant takes pleasure in extending. It distributes his business by permitting the patron more latitude for purchase. Good credit and bad credit are two different things, however. Those bills that get behind—that drag along unpaid and often times accumulate with several merchants into figures that shortly run into an obligation that the patron is unable to meet, is the factor in credit which makes poor business. Those bills work a hardship on everyone. The merchant and the buying public suffer alike. Business becomes stagnant, prices must be higher to care for the losses, uncertainty of collection

and collection expenses are the price paid for misuse of credit. The merchant must buy his goods and must pay when the bill comes due. The merchants of Chester are carrying too great a load to be unprotected.

The Merchants' Credit Association will not affect the man who pays promptly, nor the man who has an understanding regarding when and how a bill is to be paid, provided this understanding is faithfully adhered to. It is aimed solely to prompt those who are behind, and in so doing will protect the merchant from losses on bad accounts and will protect the patron from allowing his accounts to accumulate beyond his ability to pay.

Let us all co-operate in this undertaking; catch the spirit of better business, which means greater prosperity; clear the books of bad accounts and make Chester a City of People who "Pay Promptly!"

Charles Crowell Dead—Woman Negro Whom He Married Struck by Machine.

Anderson, June 16.—Charles Crowell, Negro preacher of near Denmark College, was killed and a Negro woman who was with him badly injured this morning at 11:30 o'clock when the buggy in which they were riding was demolished by a large truck owned by a scare of Columbia Boy Scouts. The accident occurred on a road between North and South streets. One of the wheels of the massive truck passed over the Negro's body, crushing his left leg.

KILLED BY LIGHTNING WHILE GATHERING WASH

John Weaver Dies Instantly While His Wife Was With Him, Sustains Severe Shock.

HIGHPOINT, N. C. June 16.—John Weaver, 44-year-old farmer, was killed instantly by lightning while removing clothes from a line in the backyard of his home here this afternoon. His wife, who was with him at the time, was knocked down and suffered a severe shock but revived. When the storm approached, Mr. Weaver and his wife went into the backyard to gather in their clothes. All but two pieces of clothes had been removed from the line when the lightning struck a tree to which the clothes line was attached. Mr. Weaver was struck several yards and was killed instantly.
