Well, our prediction came true. Not that we profess to be a prophet, but it just so happened. A few days ago we published a communication from one Mr. James Cassler, a member of the South Carolina Railroad Commission, to the other members of the commission, in which he stated that the highway bridge over the Southern Railway tracks on the Saluda road should be left as it stands. At the time we published this communication we predicted that sooner or later a serious accident would happen at this bridge and on last Monday evening an automobile containing a number of colored people went over the embankment at the bridge and two members of the party have already passed into the Great Beyond.

For any sensible man to argue that the above-mentioned structure is not dangerous is preposterous. It is not dangerous as it stands. Mr. Cassler had just as well tell the people of Chester county that a trip over the Niagara Falls is not dangerous as to tell them that this bridge is no dangerous. Mr. Cassler was elected by the people and consequently is representative of the people, but he is far from being a representative of the people when he rendered his decision as to this structure. If Mr. Cassler were today coming for public office we venture the assertion that he would not receive fifty votes in Chester county out of a possible two thousand. Mr. Cassler, by his decision as to this bridge, has ruined himself politically in Chester county.

Chester county people do not propose to stand for any such treatment as that accorded them by Mr. Cassler and we understand the other members of the commission have stated that they will be glad to reopen the case and hear from the Chester people. This case should be reopened at the earliest possible moment and arrangements made to build a safe structure before other lives are lost.

TWO MEN MEET DEATH

Another Fatally Wounded in Alabama Fight.

Carbon Hill, Ala., July 28.—Two men were killed, one fatally, killed and a boy seriously shot here early tonight in a sensational fight growing out of a controversy Deputy Sheriff Barrett had with a negro this afternoon. Both the negro and Hicks had formerly been employed in the mines here but have not been in the county.

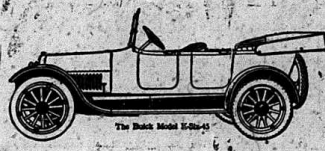
