**SELECTIVE DRAFT NOTES.**

A great many people are laboring under the impression that if they are turned down by the local board they are exempted. This is a mistake. They are discharged and are subject to call at any time. It might be necessary.

Some people have already begun to hunt the discharge papers. You have plenty of time. The medical examination is the first thing to come and the filing of your papers is to be done after you have been examined.

You will be notified by mail when to report to the local board for medical examination. However, your failure to receive the notice does not excuse you. You are required to keep yourself informed.

The local board has absolutely no voice in a claim for the discharge in New York.

When you file a claim for a discharge you must go before a notary public and make oath as to your claim. A false statement makes you liable for prosecution and the penalty is very severe.

If you should be so unpropitious as to make yourself to avoid army service you will doubtless be charged with assault and battery and attempt to defraud the government. A "gent" in Philadelphia, Penn., has already tried this and is now in jail.

**Chairman Gaston Explains Draft.**

To Those Interested:

The War Department has called on Chester County to furnish 227 men of military age under the first draft. The Local Board for this County is required to carry out the law in regard to furnishing this quota of men. The Board will be glad to give all information necessary in the notice for exemption and delay for the information to be given according to the rules and regulations of the President in regular order, publicly, as the law requires, and not to each individual person privately. This will save time, labor and trouble. The work of the Local Board is very heavy and tedious and it will take all of the time of the Local Board to do the work and therefore it will be necessary to ask for patience, indulgence, assistance and co-operation of those who are interested.

Our Country has called for men to serve in the Army. Those who answer the Country's call are the men who are to stand behind the Government. They are the men who are to bear arms and to fight. They are the ones who have been called on to respond to brave soldiers and to show their loyalty, manhood, grit, heroism and patriotism. The call has come for men to serve and not for men to be excused. Those who have already enlisted in the National Guard, regular Army and Navy have made their response. They have answered first. Now those who are drawn first will answer next. Those who are drawn among the last numbers will be called to answer later. They have not been excused and they are on the waiting list. Therefore, every true man of military age is still subject

to the call to the colors, and to do his duty.

Already some fathers have sent all of their boys and in this town and County many boys have gone. In several families two or more brothers have gone, and in other families the only son has gone to the front. This is not the time for any one to be recreant. It is not fair to those who have already responded for others to shrink. Therefore, the first step and duty confronting us is to obtain the number of men now called for to serve our Country. This is the main object of the special examination and passes the special examination and goes to the front is the hero of the day. He is the man that we now desire to honor and seek to help. His interest comes first and he must be assisted and enabled to go courageously and without faltering.

The first step to be taken by the Local Board will be to send a written notice by mail to at least six hundred men in the order in which their names have been drawn by the War Department. This notice will require one-third of those men to appear at the Court House on a day fixed in the notice for physical examination. The day fixed for the first examination will be five days after the date of the notice. If it is necessary to examine more men others will be notified. The men will be notified in the order in which their names were drawn by the War Department. But every man will be notified until the quota is obtained. The law will not stop until the full number called for is secured.

The first thing for any man to do after he gets the notice is to stand the physical examination at the Court House in Chester, S. C., on the day appointed for him to stand his examination. He will have at least five days notice of this date. The law requires him to keep posted and informed as to this date and he can do this by reading the newspapers or by getting his mail but he will be bound to find out at his own risk what day the physical examination is to be held. The physical examination will be the first step for any man to take, therefore the Board will give notice in the newspaper and by mail to let every man know when his physical examination will be held. The physical examination of every man will be held at CHESTER COURT HOUSE.

No claims for exemptions are required to be filed until after the physical examination. If anybody wants to file a claim for exemption he can get the advantages at the Clerk

of Court's office. The Board, however, will be glad to furnish these blanks on each day the examination is to be held at the Court House and to explain the blanks publicly. This will be soon enough for any person to get a blank who lives in Chester County. Please remember this, that the Board for exemption claims will be given out by the Board publicly in ample time to protect everybody. The Board cannot make any rules of its own but must follow the regulations and instructions of the War Department. Therefore, the law is the guide for us all and must be followed by us all.
