A sufficient number of names to call an election in Chester to decide whether or not Chester, will issue \$140,000 in bonds for street improvements and \$35,000 for water works improvements and extensions have been secured. The committee men who have the lists are anxious to secure more than the majority and will probably keep the lists until the later part of the week when they will be turned over to the officials who will then open the books of registration, as required by law. As soon as possible after the registration books are closed the electricity will be held. It is generally believed there will be very little opposition in the election and it is hoped that Chester will be able to get a considerable amount of the work done on her streets this year.

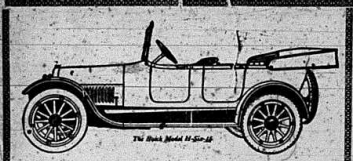

WILL NEVER BE RETRACED.

In republishing the long indictment of the liquor traffic by the United States Senate Committee for its effort to control the policies of the country and for its pro-German work through the brewery interests, the Springfield (Mass.) Republican says:

"But it is also clear that the only way to free the nation from such an incubus is to exterminate it. The only way to do that and to outlaw the entire trade, and that stop has been taken. It will never be retraced."

It is not too thick that there is any more likelihood that the liquor traffic will again be given its power for evil in this country than there is that the slave trade will ever be restored to America. Prior to the Civil War many ardent advocates of slavery brought forth vigorous arguments in behalf of the wisdom of slavery. We have a book written prior to the Civil War by a distinguished Methodist clergyman who undertook to prove by an interpretation of the Bible that to abolish slavery would be to go directly contrary to the teaching of the Bible. Indeed, he held that slavery was of Divine origin and should be maintained by the South. His argument in behalf of slavery was far more plausible and had more justification than any argument that can possibly be advanced in behalf of the liquor traffic. Indeed, slavery took millions of people from the barbarism of Africa, civilized them and evangelized hundreds of thousands of them, resulting in probably the greatest piece of missionary work ever done in the last five or six centuries.

This slavery had something to do with the liquor traffic, has nothing to do with it. It cannot fly except on the broken hearts and the ruined lives of its devotees. It has filled the world through the centuries with widows and orphans, with lives completely wrecked for this world and souls lost for eternity through its accursed effect on mankind. No one dares today to uphold slavery; no one dares to defend the opium traffic or the "personal liberty" bill. We shall permit cocaine and opium and other deadly drugs to be freely sold and used. But the arguments for slavery and for "personal liberty" in the handling and the use of deadly drugs are far stronger than any argument that can be advanced in behalf of the liquor traffic. WILSON MAY AGREE TO SLIGHT CHANGE

Opinion Grows That Treaty Will Be Modified

Washington, July 27.—The president has said he would consider starting of swing around the circle early in August.

Washington, July 27.—No word from the White House today in regard to intimations that President Wilson before beginning his speaking tour, might make some public expression of his views on the restriction of the covenant of the league of nations, which some Republican senators insist are necessary to its ratification.

Although no one in the president's official family would take notice of these intimations, which are "washed around" the impression continues to grow in congressional and official circles that the president has some such idea in his mind.

Tomorrow the president will receive callers at his desk in the executive offices for the first time in several days. All his appointments are with Democratic members of the house or senate.

This morning the president's acceptance of Mr. Wilson, attending church in the afternoon he took an automobile ride into the country.

An announcement regarding the president's forthcoming trip to the Pacific coast is expected from the White House tomorrow or Tuesday. Mr. Wilson has said he would make a consideration an itinerary calling for his departure from Washington August 5. If this date is finally decided upon he is due to arrive in Los Angeles August 12, after making a few speeches in the Middle West.

It originally had been expected that the trip would not start before August 10, at the earliest.

Now, however, Mr. Wilson is decided to begin speaking to start his "swing around the circle" as soon as possible. His speeches will be designed to give a clear cut analysis of the conditions he feels menace the league of nations a necessity and the things he hopes its adoption will accomplish. The president also probably will take occasions to answer his critics.

Extraordinary arrangements are being made to accommodate a large number of newspaper correspondents on the trip, requests for permission to accompany the chief executive having poured into the White House from all sections of the country. From present indications at least two "score" correspondents may go along.
