Number of Missionaries Sent to East Anderson, Aug. 15.—Dr. and Mrs. Sam Orr Pruitt will Tuesday for China on the S. S. Empress of Japan. They are going to be missionaries from the First Baptist church of this city.

Mr. Pruitt was originally from Batesburg and is a daughter of I. D. Cullum and a granddaughter of the late Rev. N. N. Burrows, so well known among South Carolina Baptists.
