According to present plans the young men selected in Chester county for the National Army will go in training at Camp Jackson, near Columbia, S. C., and will be expected to be called for another examination about 75 men will leave Chester about September fifth, for the cantonment. It is now stated that the call for men from Columbia will be ready for approximately ten thousand men on September first. While Chester county drafted 227 men, they will not all be called for duty on the same day. The first call will be for approximately one-third of Chester's quota, and it is probable that the farmers, who have been selected in the first quota, will be called last. This does not mean that the call will be last called for the army but, means that they will be the last called of the first 227 men selected from the county. By leaving the farmers until the last they assist them in this step will avoid them in the handling of their crops.

### An Ordinance.

An Ordinance to Repeal the Public Health in the City of Chester.

Be ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the city of Chester, in council assembled, and by the authority of the same:

That from and after ninety days after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to erect, maintain or permit to be used on any premises in the city of Chester, owned or controlled by such person, firm or corporation, whether as owner, tenant or otherwise, any privy or dry-dock within two hundred fifty feet of any street along which a city sewer is or shall hereafter be maintained, or on any premises situated across which any such sewer extends, within two hundred fifty feet of such sewer. Provided, that this ordinance shall not be construed to authorize the maintenance or further use of any privy or dry-dock where the same is furnished by any ordinance now in force. Any violation of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not over thirty days.

Done and ratified in council this 24th day of August, A. D. 1917.
