Scope and Content Note: **Includes by-laws, minutes, reports, brochures, correspondence, membership lists, newsletters, and other records not only of the Rock Hill Council, but of the South Carolina Council on Human Relations with which the local council was affiliated. The rest of the collection consists of various reference materials for use by different members of the Rock Hill Council. The Collection primarily pertains to race relations in South Carolina.**

Much of the correspondence consists of communication between the Rock Hill Council on Human Relations with which the Rock Hill Council was affiliated. There is much correspondence between the members of local council and Alice Spearman of the South Carolina Council. The Rock Hill Council was established by the Rock Hill City Council in 1954 to serve as a means of communication between the whites and the blacks of the city. 2-3	13-18	<p>RECORDS RELATING TO THE SOUTH CAROLINA COUNCIL ON HUMAN RELATIONS</p> <p>By-laws, reports, brochures, speeches, newspaper clippings, program notes, newsletters, bulletins, position papers and other records. The S.C Council was affiliated with the South Carolina Regional Council and was dedicated to the equal opportunity for all peoples of South Carolina. It was the successor organization to the South Carolina Committee on Inter-racial Cooperation established in 1919 under the leadership of Bishop Kirkman Finlay of the upper Diocese of the Episcopal Church. The name changed occurred in 1954. There is material missing for some years. Communication of the S.C. Council can be found in the records of the Rock Hill City Council on Human Relations.
