Mileage of Representatives Big Item—Extra Pay for Employees over \$150,000

Washington, Aug. 13.—Statistics around the capitol have figured that the special session of congress called to enact a new tariff law cost the American people the tidy sum of half a million dollars.

Chair among the members of course, is the mileage of members of congress, each representative and senator, whether he travels a mile or a thousand, draws down two cents for each mile between his residence and the capitol by the nearest practicable route.

RUMOR SAYS S. C. MILITIA MAY CEASE TO EXIST

Report Sent Out From Columbia Causes Alarm Among South Carolina Militia

Columbia, Aug. 11.—There is a rumor prevalent in the state that there will be no more encampments of the South Carolina National Guard. The funds for the encampments of the regiment are furnished by the Federal Government under the Militia Act, which is known as the Dick Act.

The Militia Act. This act provides that the militia of each State shall be organized, trained, and equipped at the expense of the United States.

The militia are to be armed, uniformed and equipped at the expense of the United States, subject to inspection by the United States, as well as by officers of the militia, and to take part in the encampments, manoeuvres and field instruction of the regular army, receiving, while thus participating, the same pay and allowance as the regulars.

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ROUGH MATERIALS TO BE WORN

Howspuns, Diagonals and Hair Fabrics Are the Mod for Tailor Makers

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RIGHT PROCESS OF CANNING TOMATOES

EXACT PLAN WITH WHICH IT IS DONE

Following Directions and Tomatoes Will not Spoil—The System as Related

In your issue of July 15, I notice your comments to the enquiry of H. G. of Simpson, Ark., in regard to canning tomatoes. You tell him, in substance, to "dip them in boiling water and peel, place in cans, put on top and solder up, then boil for five minutes, take out of boiler, solder the holes in the tops and they are ready for packing."

I have been canning tomatoes for several years and through mistake, I once omitted the boiling of one crate (27 No. 2 cans) and the result was about one-half of them spoiled.

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ACCEPTS MELL'S RESIGNATION

Clemson Trustees Accept Resignation of President Mell But Ask Him to Hold on Until Successor is Chosen

Clemson College, Aug. 14th.—The board of trustees of Clemson college today accepted the resignation of President P. H. Mell but asked him to continue in office until his successor was chosen, which he promised to do.

A revision of the rules removing contact between the commandant and the president was adopted and it is thought that this trouble will be eliminated in the future. Some good work was done by the board which adjourned today.

The new Lincoln One Cent. A supply of the new "Lincoln" one cent pieces which the treasury department has caused to be designed and struck off in honor of the 100th anniversary of Lincoln's birth, have come.

The new coin is handsome in appearance, and is of the same size as the familiar "one cent" design. On the face of the penny is the head of Abraham Lincoln, in profile, facing toward the right.

The motto "IN GOD WE TRUST" is on the left of the figure of the word "LIBERTY" is on the right hand corner is the date 1900. On the reverse side the words "ONE CENT" stand in the center and beneath them "UNITED STATES OF AMERICA" in small letters.

The artist is Victor J. Brenner, a 37 year old Russian who came to this country as a boy and sold matches in the street by day, while he attended at Cooper Union by night.
