ANOTHER AIR RAID ON LONDON COASTS

MANY ARE KILLED AND WOUNDED AT CHATHAM BY GERMAN AIRPLANES.

FOR THIRD SUCCESSIVE DAY

Teutons Have Dropped Bombs on English—At Chatham 107 Were Killed and 46 Injured—Six Airplanes Took Part in Raiding.

Another raid on England has taken place. The English coast was shelled as well as the London district.

The official report of the raid says: "A considerable number of enemy airplanes crossed the southeast coast of England on Tuesday night and dropped bombs at a number of places. Some of the bombs reached the London district, where bombs were dropped. No reports of damage have yet been received."

London—In Monday night's air raid 107 persons were killed and 46 wounded at Chatham. It is announced officially.

The victims were naval ratings. Six airmen took part in the raid. In addition to the naval casualties one British plane was killed and six injured.

The announcement follows: "Lord Fisher (commander of the British fleet) reports that on Tuesday night's raid was carried out by about six enemy airplanes which proceeded to the south bank of the Thames estuary to Chatham."

"Bombs were dropped in the Isle of Thanet, in the vicinity of Sheerness Channel, between 10:40 p. m. and 11:30 p. m. There were no army casualties. Civilian casualties reported at present are: Killed, one; injured, six. The material damage was slight."

"Our machines went up and anti-aircraft guns opened fire, but without result. The secretary of the Admiralty reports that in the course of the raid light aircraft following casualties were caused to naval ratings. Killed, 167; wounded, 56."

"A despatch to The Star from Chatham says that part of the naval barracks was struck by a bomb during the night's raid, this causing serious loss of life. The Chatham command, the message states, entirely escaped damage."

GERMANS CAPTURE BIG RUSSIAN PORT

RIGA IS EVACUATED BY DEFENDERS WHO FLEE EASTWARD IN DISORDER.

ROAD TO PETROGRAD OPEN

Great Fortresses and Armies May Have Been Destroyed Before Evacuation. No Indications of Russian Establishing New Lines.

Riga, Russia's big port on the Gulf of Riga, is in the hands of the Germans and its garrison and the civilian population are in retreat eastward.

Following up rapidly the advantage gained in driving the Russians across the Dvina, the Germans have thrust across this stream and captured the city of Riga. The Russian defenders, some of whom offered resistance, but others who allowed the white fleet, giving the invaders no trouble in marching up the eastern bank of the Dvina, to Riga, 15 miles distant. Storing the tide of the advance, the Russian commander ordered an evacuation.

NEW AID FOR FARMERS

Activities of Uncle Sam Under New Law.

Work of Government in Co-operation With Producers to Be Enlarged in Many Ways.

Activities of Uncle Sam along the line of co-operation with the farmers of the United States in the increase of production to be extended in a large number of ways under the provisions of the new food production increase enacted by congress.

There are some of the things to be done by Uncle Sam under the new law:

Eleven million three hundred and forty-two thousand four hundred dollars will be used in stimulating production, for protecting and conserving foods and for a survey of the country's food resources.

Staff of county agents will be increased and the new law will be stationed in practically every agricultural county in the United States that will co-operate with the farmer and the state agricultural college.

Women county agents for demonstration work in home economics to be increased in rural counties, and similar agents to be placed in towns and cities for the first time.

Farmer-ship service to be extended in cooperation with United States department of labor to assist in bringing farmers and farm laborers together.

County-wide survey to be made of food production in each county in the United States. Estimated family consumption of food to be made.

WHITE MAN IS KILLED BY NEGRO

Mr. Joseph J. Williams Shot Down by Negro—Sheriff and Deputy Fired at Fleeing Fugitive—Negro Bears Bad Reputation—Will Be Classed As a Deserter.

Mr. Joseph J. Williams, who resides at 125 W. Lacy street, this city, and who was shot by Tom Stroud, colored, Tuesday night about nine o'clock, died at the Chester Sanatorium, where he had been taken for medical treatment, Wednesday night.

Mr. Williams, who for some time past has been conducting an automobile transfer, was engaged by Sheriff Anderson and Deputy Howe Wednesday night last, when he was on the Pedee bridge section where they were going to arrest a negro, Tom Stroud, who had recently drawn a pistol on a white man threatening to kill him. Upon arriving at the home of the negro Mr. Williams was stationed at a window, Sheriff Anderson at one door and Deputy Howe at another door. Deputy Howe knocked on the door and aroused the negro, who walked to the door where he had been taken for medical treatment, Wednesday night.

As soon as the gun was fired Sheriff Anderson and Deputy Howe ran to the window and saw the fleeing negro shot at him five or six times but failed to bring him to a halt. Realizing that Mr. Williams was seriously injured, they directed their attention to getting him to a doctor, which was accomplished about eight o'clock. Sheriff Anderson for Deputy Howe can run an automobile and it was necessary for them to secure the aid of William Jamison to get Mr. Williams to Chester.

Sheriff Anderson telephoned Mr. Sam H. White, at Rock Hill, to bring his blood hound and secure the fugitive. Mr. White arrived about two o'clock Wednesday morning but during the meantime it had rained and the dog was unable to take the trail for any considerable distance and the whereabouts of the negro is yet unknown.

Stroud bears the reputation of being a bad negro and formed a dislike for Mr. Foster Dury, whom he was working for near the scene, because Mr. Dury insisted on his registering June 5th. Shortly after this Mr. Dury lost his dwelling and it is generally supposed that he set fire to it. Stroud was notified by the local board of exemption to appear for physical examination in a short while but failed to appear. It is stated that if they got him they would have to come after him.

The coroner will be asked to offer a reward for the negro and it is probable that the county will offer a reward in addition to the one from the State. In addition to the charge of murder the negro will be classed as a deserter, due to the fact that he failed to appear for examination, and no doubt government officials will also institute a hunt for the fugitive.

Mr. Williams was about forty-five years of age and was a native of Chester county, for several years being a member of the Christian Science church. He is survived by his widow, one daughter and one son, who is now in the army.

MUST UTILIZE OTHER CEREALS

Uncle Sam's Food Administration declares situation can be met only by Reduction in Consumption.

Uncle Sam's food administration has issued the following statement: The United States and Canada have a deficit for this year of over 400,000,000 bushels in the amount required for normal consumption of wheat and neutral of Europe, on basis of normal wheat consumption of 1,000,000,000 bushels for a three-year pre-war period. The normal requirements of France, Italy, the United Kingdom, and Belgium for the pre-war period, averaged 381,000,000 bushels of wheat, and 1,000,000,000 bushels of neutral of Europe.
