WOMAN STOWAWAY FOUND.

Reached New York After Ten Days of Aboard Sloop.

After living for ten days in a black hole four feet by six, which at times was flooded to foot deep with salt water, says The New York Times, Joan Tucker, 22 years old, a young English woman, was lifted out last Monday night by the officers of the American liner Philadelphia, in a fainting condition and was detained at a storeroom. She was so weak she could scarcely stand alone and she could scarcely trust and grimace from lying on the iron plates.

The young woman is said to have been smuggled on board the liner in Southampton on Friday night August 20th, by Edward Manning, a freeman and a citizen of the United States. The freeman is alleged to have declared that unless the young woman came to New York and married him he would commit suicide.

When dragged from the hole, the stowaway was a blue dungaree overall suit. When she went to Ellis Island yesterday morning she wore some new clothing that Manning had purchased for her in New York after the ship docked on the pier.

Officers and engineers of the Philadelphia knew before leaving Southampton that the young woman had come aboard the ship. She wore men's clothing, but could not discover her hiding place, although several searches were made. The officers explained that the man who had bought the potatoes was the one in such a place as the one in which the stowaway was found. It was in the eyes of the ship between the plates of the bow and was so low, that she could stand upright only by leaning forward. The only air came through a locker where potatoes were stored for the voyage.

The girl had been passed down through the mangle in Southampton and could not get out without aid. Yet, throughout the voyage, the woman stowaway said that she experienced fear but once. That was when, on August 22, the Philadelphia struck a whale. The large mammal switched tail, which beat upon the bow plate of the ship. The first blow knocked her off her feet. Others made her think she had been struck a reef and was foundering. She lost all hope for life, and the battering ceased the ship steamed on. At last the Philadelphia reached her destination. The ten day nightmare was over. America was at hand.

Then the actions of the man for whom the woman was alleged to have made the desperate venture led to her detection. As she arrived, Edward Manning attracted the attention of the officers. He went about asking for women's wear among the storeroom passengers.

So when the ship was made fast at her pier at the foot of West Twenty-second street, doors were given to the watchmen on the deck and the quartermaster on the gangways to look out for a young woman going ashore during the day. And a watch was kept for Manning.

Shortly after 9 o'clock two officers heard that Manning had returned to the ship after being questioned in the evening. They found him with the bundle of woman's clothing he had purchased ashore and were questioning him with the same questions from the low of the ship. Running into the potato locker with an electric torch, the officers said they saw James Fallon, another freeman, arguing with a young woman, half of whose body was out of the mangle. Just as they arrived, they said, the freeman hit her with a knife to make her go back but she could not move without help from outside.

The young woman was removed and given medical attention. Manning and Fallon were locked up in the brig for the night and sent to the Tombs yesterday.

REQUESTS OF COTTON ASSOCIATION DENIED BY GOVERNOR HARDING.

Head of Reserve Board Tells Cotton Growers to "Call the People" to Quit Talking Calamity.

Washington, Sept. 15.—Requests of the American Cotton Association for government aid in financing the marketing of the cotton crop of the south were denied today by Governor Harding of the federal reserve board. The representatives of the association asked extension of credit on cotton loans estimated at approximately \$100,000,000 in order to permit growers to hold their cotton and prevent dumping on the market at a loss.

The solution of the problem facing southern cotton producers, Governor Harding said, lies with the producers themselves and in "their own hands." "Go back home and tell the people to quit talking calamity," the governor declared, suggesting that the cotton men sell their high grade stock to meet the demands as they arise, which would enable them to gradually liquidate their debts and hold their low grade cotton for a better market.

The federal reserve board is keeping alive to the importance of everything to maintain agriculture in all sections of the country, the governor told all parts of the country, but he added that the board members authorized to deal in prices, but the actions might have an effect upon them. Reported that the board members of this year's staple crops are \$22,000,000,000, the governor stated, and extension of credit to assist producers in the growing season would mean about \$30,000,000,000 in loans.

THE GIRL WHO VANISHED. It was on Christmas night, 1910, that the world received the first definite news of a missing girl. A statement issued from the labor headquarters in Detroit, Mich., recently advised that more than 100,000 workmen in that city have recently been discharged and that there are more vacant rooms in Detroit today than during any time in the past few years.
The matter of taxation is an item of interest to almost every citizen in the country and is something which comes up for discussion very often.
In the Gastonia Gazette of last Tuesday we noticed an article with reference to the tax assessment in that thriving city.
During the year 1919 Gastonia's tax rate for city purposes, including interest on all bonds, was \$1.20 per hundred dollars valuation. The rate of taxation for school purposes was 50 cents, making the total city tax \$1.70.
It will be recalled that in North Carolina this year property is returned at its actual value and, such being the case, it was necessary for the various towns to revise their levies. Gastonia has, for the year 1920, assessed a tax levy of 51 cents per hundred dollars, on the actual value of property, for city purposes, and 45 cents for school purposes.
The city of Chester has a levy of 20 cents per hundred dollars and property is returned at less than one-half its actual value. Such being the case taxes in Chester are less than one-fifth what they are in Gastonia, and still we Chester people complain about our taxes being high. We also notice in the Gazette that

the Gaston county commissioners have fixed the state and county tax rates, which includes schools, roads, etc., at 55 cents per hundred dollars actual valuation. Gaston county has a special road tax of 10 cents per hundred dollars.
We have often heard it said that a low tax rate was an inducement to enterprises of various kinds to locate in a town, but since seeing Gaston county's figures we have about come to the conclusion that there is nothing to the argument.

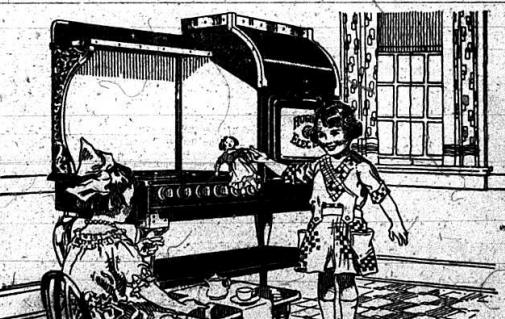

SEEK NEAR AT HAND.

We often waste a great deal of time in going out of our way to look for something that, if we only knew it, is close at hand. The remarkable impression we sometimes receive of the insignificant, homely things of life are not worth bothering about is merely another detail of the same fact. We are never satisfied until we have every energy to the limit in the effort to acquire something that is not easily acquired by others. If it is easy to get we quickly reach the conclusion that it is not worth very much, and, therefore, will be of no use to us. It may be that we may possess it already, or in certain degree, but because it is tarred with the homedead brand we scorn it, and set our eyes upon some distant peak of attainment which, after all, may not yield us the wholesome results we anticipate. If we comb down to the heart of the matter we are often forced to the conclusion that a large part of our happiness is anticipatory. By this it is not intended to convey the impression that life is not well filled at times with wholesome happiness—that fact is easily acknowledged by the majority of people—but, on the other hand, most of us know from experience that if we were not for the forward look, the anticipation of delights yet to come, the constant desire to achieve still larger fulfillments life would lose much of its meaning and even grandeur and joy. There are some persons who call this spirit of anticipation merely the urge of ambition. Perhaps it may be that, but for those others who look upon it as something more. To the latter, it makes the courage to look ahead and to get something out of the effort, the clutching at bright hopes that seem forever just out of reach; the eager promise of something better that is just yet to come, the "stupid patting" of the curtains so that we may peer beyond. That is what anticipation means to some of us, and that is why we cling to it and find a little happiness in it. It may be also that is why we do not consent to look for the big things in life in the old familiar scenes, and why we strike out into the beyond where we feel that success is waiting for us. We ignore them, and by doing so turn them over to others to work as best they may, many of whom perhaps have more than enough to do in their own search for something they failed to find at their doors. It is the same story everywhere; some blessings are rarely understood, while those far removed are endowed with an exaggerated importance.

PEACE TAKES WINGS IF MAYOR MACSWINEY DIES.

London, Sept. 14.—Negotiations for the settlement of the Irish question, which are described as the most promising as yet initiated, will be nullified if Terrence MacSwiney, lord mayor of Cork, dies in British prison, where he is continuing his hunger strike, says the Dublin correspondent of the Times.
Secret negotiations on the basis of full self-government within the empire have been going on in the last three months by the most prominent leaders of modern opinion and influential republicans, he declared. The moderates have at last been told, he said, that nothing further can be done while MacSwiney is near death, and if the lord mayor dies, the last hope of settlement on the proposed basis will disappear.

A bill has been introduced in the British Parliament to check divorce. One provision calls for full terms for both male and female co-respondents in divorce suits.

Australia, which progresses much of the world, is considering a program of building textile factories, which would, it is hoped, be large enough in about 15 years, to use all wool grown in the country.

THE WANDERING JEW.

On January 1, 1894, Michob Ader, calling himself the "Wandering Jew," appeared at Paris and created an extraordinary sensation among persons of all ranks.
Ader stated that he had lived for 1500 years, having been originally an usher at the court of judgment in Jerusalem, where all criminal cases were tried, and that because he had thrust Jesus out of the hall, saying, "Go, why tarriest Thou?" the Messiah answered, "I go, but tarry thou until I come," thereby sentencing him to live until the day of judgment. He claimed to have been in Rome when it was burned by Nero; to have witnessed the return of Saladin after his conquests; to have been in Constantinople when Salimen built the royal mosque; to have known Tamelane, the Scythian, and Scander Beg, prince of Epirus; to have seen Balzac carried in a cage by order of Tamelane; to remember the splendors of Babylon and of Egypt; the empire of the Saracens and the Crusades. However, he admitted that he had not witnessed the sacking of Jerusalem, declaring that he was then in Rome at the court of Vespasian.

The pretensions of the Wandering Jew were supported by many persons who claimed to have seen him in various places throughout the world. Moreover, contemporary history bears out his contentions by stating that he was tested by a number of learned men of the city and that it was not possible to address him in any language with which he was unfamiliar. After securing a vast amount of notoriety, Ader finally disappeared without having made any attempt to capitalize his strange experiences and show some learning.

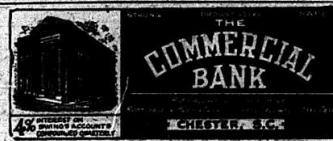
