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SUGGESTS METHOD TO HOLD COTTON

Huffman Has Plan to Withhold Distress Staple From Market.

To the Editor of the State: An Monday was set aside as Cotton Day and the cotton associations were called to meet with their friends and all interested in raising the price of cotton at every cotton seat in the cotton belt...

Let each association in every county in the cotton states appoint a committee of say, five members. Let this committee raise by subscription a sufficient fund to take care of say \$50,000 or \$60,000...

Now, then, let's get down to brass tacks and if every one who can and certainly whose duty it is to help make this movement a success, let me know as I am willing to do, will certainly win this fight. I don't know much money, but I will certainly do my part...

MOTHER DENIED POSSESSION OF HER CHILD BY COURT

Had Been Adopted by Another Family and Judge Thought Best to Leave it There.

Greensboro, N. C., Sept. 21.—Mrs. Mary Smith Sanders, of Johnston mill village, on the outskirts of Greensboro, was denied the possession of her eight-year-old daughter in a habeas corpus hearing before Judge T. J. Shaw late Saturday afternoon...

It was first necessary to force the North Carolina Children's Home Society to divulge the name of the people who have the child and the hearing Saturday was to obtain possession of it, if possible.

The child's mother's story and that of witnesses in her behalf was substantially as follows: Over five years ago when she was a widow (she has since married Saunders) and living in Siler City, earning a livelihood for herself and her four children by working in a cotton mill where she had been employed with typhoid fever and came near dying. Her husband had recently been killed in a train wreck...

At the mother's request, a notary public placed his signature to a paper by which the mother gave up all rights to the child. It was stated that the mother objected to signing the paper and some of the witnesses testified that the agent told the mother that she could get her child back soon.

CAMPAIN PROBE WILL THRUST IN NEW CHANNELS

James Gerard Testifies Democrats Will Be Satisfied With Million Dollars.

Washington, Sept. 22.—Phases of the campaign activity, involving money, which have hitherto been unexplored, will be given their full scope by the committee probing campaign expenditures, resumes this morning at the cotton market in New Orleans.

James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany and now financial adviser to the Democratic party, was the first witness, instead of William Boyce Thompson, who was called when Mr. Gerard said that the Democrats would be satisfied with a million dollar campaign fund and considered a campaign market for the money and would turn back amounts in excess of that figure.

The witness said the Democrats had raised \$128,000 thus far. He told the committee of the fund organization and promised the names certainly will help the business men and the bankers' mood, and they ought to take a leading part in making this movement a success.

The health authorities responsible are to be highly praised for leading the way in a practice that should become universal in the State.

As a consequence of this act most of the counties in the State do not attempt to work whites out of the demoralization of the convicts. The long-term men are sent to the penitentiary and those sentenced for less than six months are left in the county jail.

STORM PASSES WEST-INTENSER.

Railroad, Wire, and Other Public Services Hit Hard—More Than 1,000 Telephone Calls Made in New Orleans, Damage to Crops Not Great.

New Orleans, Sept. 22. — With the passing of the tropical hurricane into the interior of Louisiana from a point just west of the mouth of the Atchafalaya river and near Morgan City, railroad and wire companies and other public service corporations in the vicinity of New Orleans tonight were making efforts to restore service.

More than a thousand telephones were out of order here tonight, telegraphic communication other than by trunk wires to the larger cities was practically impossible.

Available information tonight did not seem to warrant any great anxiety regarding sugar and rice crops of that section of the state in the path of the hurricane. Reports of only minor damage at Morgan City led to the belief here that the hurricane was not of great intensity and had weakened perceptibly by the time it reached the coast.

Along the gulf coast vast amounts of damage were done to crops and equipment and caused considerable alarm in fishing villages.

All outbound craft, held at Port Eads by storm warnings, steamed to sea today.

All chest trains on the Louisville & Nashville Railroad were annulled today, according to officials of that line in this city on account of the damage done to the bridges at Big-lets and Chef Menteur.

As an experiment in a Chicago factory an automobile was belted to provide light and power for 72 days, 24 hours a day.

The cleaning of the streets of Chester was ordered placed in the hands of Captain Boldridge, health officer, and it is hoped to get the work going in the near future. 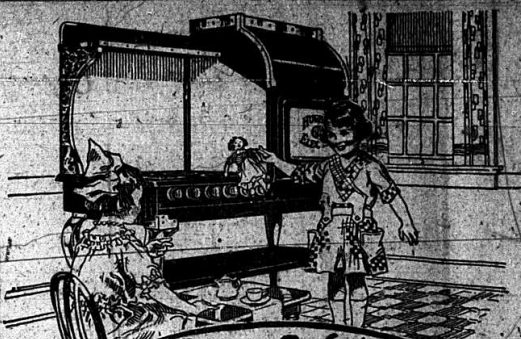

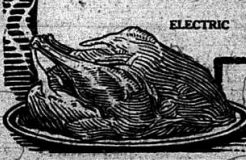

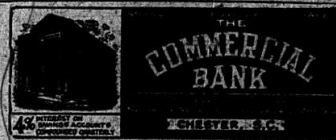

IS THE HUMAN MIND TIRELESS?

What is "Mental Fatigue"? Can reading or study tire the mind as running or hard labor tires the body? Dr. Percy G. Bates, assistant professor of physiology at Harvard, thinks not. In an article on "Types of Fatigue," contributed to The American Journal of Public Health (Chicago, August), Professor Bates tells us that physical fatigue is due to the flooding of the tissues with the waste products of muscular exertion. This mental exertion there is "no such flood of waste." What we call mental fatigue is a nervous phenomenon—reaction. Cannot monotonous, not an actual poisoning of the organism. It is why emotion tires us more quickly than purely mental work. Sometimes, too, what we call mental fatigue is merely the loss of some one of our many systems of self-control, shown by unrest or "irregularities." Or it may depend simply on the formation of bad habits, not only in conduct but in trains of thought involving anxiety or fear. The view, Dr. Bates says, is distinctive. In other words, one may be drilled into a state of mental quietude and nervousness. "When fatigue, as mentioned, shows signs first of the muscles. This is natural enough. However much the medical may have entered into modern human life most people's activity is still measurable in terms of mechanical work. The muscles form about half the body, and when they are vigorously employed all the tissues are flooded with their waste-products so that there is a sympathetic depression of glandular function and probably of the cerebral currents which attend the intellectual processes. The massive propyl ions of the muscles must be not forgotten. . . . Bodily fatigue can limit one for application to mental tasks—but the pursuit of mental work can not develop great quantities of end-products that shall saturate and narcotize the ganglia. . . . A period of mental great may give one drenched to exercise, but disinclination is not the same thing as incapacity. If there is any loss of power in such a case it is probably not represented in the muscles, but at their seat of government.

Cerebral processes involve but very small masses of protoplasm, and they are doubtless conducted with extreme economy. In these conditions which are accurately described as "mental fatigue" we usually assume that this is a possibility. It is, however, very probable that the nervous system is not so much affected as we assume. It is a rule that what we call fatigue in connection with the steady performance of some monotonous mental operation.
