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THE BIG MEETING

The "Gypsy" Smith, Jr., revival meeting opened in the tent on the corner of the city square in Chester Sunday night with something like 2,000 people present. Since then the attendance has been steadily increasing, and it is estimated that more than 300 were vacant. Many people from various sections of the county were at the meeting.

Last night there was a large attendance of about 1,800 people present, which was a much larger crowd than was expected of Monday night. Mr. Chas. J. Allen, of New Jersey, who is director of the meeting, has already lined up an actor of approximately 250 voices, who he rendered excellent music. Miss Laura Hogue, of New Jersey, who has been a member of Mr. Smith's party for three or four years, is the pianist.

It will be necessary to raise appreciable sums of money for the expenses of the meeting and it is hoped to secure this amount this week. Mr. Smith will receive what the people of Chester and vicinity are willing to give him in two collections at the close of the four week's meeting.

This week is known as demoniacal week at the meeting, Monday night being Hell-day, Tuesday night, Presbyterian; Wednesday, Baptist; Thursday, A. R. P. and Friday, Episcopal.

Mr. Smith announced last night that next Monday night will be Masonic night and the masons of Chester and Chester county are expected to assemble at the 10:30 o'clock service in the large hall in the room at seven-thirty. A special reservation will be made for them.

Mr. Smith is a very forceful speaker and his two sermons were enthusiastically enjoyed by the large crowd present at each meeting.

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THE NEW ERA.

We are living in a new era. There is no parallel in all history for the changes that have taken place since 1914. More events have crowded themselves in these past few years than would ordinarily have come from a century of evolution. We are unfamiliar with this new world; we cannot measure the revolution of thought and feeling that has taken place, while the old order of society has dissolved, and the new taking shape. There are many possible forebodings about the outcome. It seems at times that the bitterness of the struggle through which we have just passed has brought out all that is worse in human nature and the world is steadily going to the south. New hatreds have been born and people generally are irritable and unreasonably; there are strikes, race riots, and recklessness everywhere. Even our recreations are an index to the spirit of the age; there is something very abnormal about the modern dance. It is really an expression of the disordered mood of the age. The whole thing is psychological and spiritual. People are just weary and mentally sick and it is going to take much patience and forbearance if the world is to be cured. First, our leadership must come from the best in character and intellect—men of tolerance and fairness and mentally equal to the task ahead. Second, we need positively self-discipline, finer moral standards and ideals. The character of a people or a time, is the sign of the character of its individuals. Third, we must overcome this delusion about shorter hours and higher wages; everybody needs a reasonable amount of leisure and recreation. Fourth, we must have a sense of work is needed worse. Every life we created to enrich time and community, with the product of either hand or brain, rather than just for recreation. The demand for luxuries, more than for necessities, lies at the bottom of much of the call for higher wages. If people worked more efficiently, saved more money and found out the trouble with self and quit wondering what is the matter with the world, better conditions would follow. Beneath our faults, deep in the human soul, new forces of brotherhood and good are at work. "A loftier race than the world has known shall rise with the flame of freedom in their souls and the light of knowledge in their eyes." In this new age labor is to be the unowned king and equality and freedom its rule.

chairman, presided. A report was heard from T. L. Manning, temporary secretary, who was sent as a delegate to the New Orleans convention. A report was made of the membership of the county association and money collected as follows: Membership \$500, money collected, \$3,400. Committee volunteered to go into the districts not yet worked and obtain members in them. It is not feared that less than 1,000 members will be secured in this county.

Mr. Manning made a strong address and outlined a method of financing care of the cotton crop and enable the farmer to get his price of 36 cents and above. It is certain that Dillon County will organize a corporation very soon to take up all the distress cotton put upon the market. The plan is outlined in that the corporation shall buy all the cotton offered at a quarter of a cent above any price offered by any other buyer or factor until the price of 36 cents is reached.

Dillon County will need a \$300,000 corporation and it is believed by almost every farmer that the capital stock could be secured within 48 hours.

A mass meeting of the farmers together with all the association membership, is planned for Friday, September 19. L. D. Jennings of Sumter, originator of the county corporation plan, will be present and address the gathering.
