MISS STEWART ROYAL PRINCESS

ARCHDUCHESS, OTHER ROYALTIES, GUESTS

Splendid Gifts Include Heirlooms of Imperial Families, but Herself the Fairest

Special Cable Dispatch to the World.

Dingwallshire, Scotland, Sept. 17.—The dull, cold town has been transformed, visited by the excitement attending the wedding, next Wednesday, of Miss Anita Stewart, the charming American heiress, and Prince Miguel, of Braganza, the first marriage in Scotland in which one of our birth participates since the Reformation.

The main street of Dingwall, usually deserted, is now constantly alive with aristocrats from the castle, and American dollars and Austrian gold are flowing into the pockets of the shopkeepers—naturally to their great enthusiasm.

Mrs. James Henry Smith, the bride's mother, has been congratulated by no vulgar crowd would attend the wedding. Mrs. Martin and her daughter, Lady Craven, have sent gifts. One is an exquisite ivory workbox made in India centuries ago. The bridegroom's gifts are more valuable. The Prince has given her with gems that belonged to his family, including a massive ruby necklace with pearls. A sash can be detached and used as an ornament for the hair. It is on a quivering gold wire and probably will decorate the bride at her wedding.

But most valuable gift that the groom gives her will be won by the bride at the wedding. It is diamonds, a miniature of her father, the marvelous jeweler's art, like an ostrich plume. As it approaches its use the gems are graduated. This marvelous gift was presented to Prince Miguel, King of Portugal, Prince Miguel's grandfather, to the Prince's mother, sister of the late Emperor Franz Joseph, and was worn by queens of Portugal for years.

Some of the other royal gifts to the bride are rings, in one of which is set a diamond of the crown of Portugal. Another is a bracelet of exquisite emeralds. Some other are tortoise shell combs tipped with extremely valuable diamonds. Yet another is a diamond lace seen by the Archduchess Marie, widow of Archduke Ludovic, brother of the Emperor of Austria.

The duke of Braganza has given his son a check for a large amount. Miss Stewart has given him a set of pearls, diamonds, and among her other gifts, a miniature of her father in a frame of gold, studded with jewels. The Princess of Schwarzenberg, one

of the bridegroom's aunts, has given her a pair of pearls with an exquisitely jeweled handle.

Among a certain set in the Austrian court there is a strong feeling against his marriage because of his popularity, being a handsome and dashing cavalier. Besides, Austrian aristocrats object to his giving up all claims to the Portuguese throne as he did willingly for such a wife.

His debts, they say are enormous, and are to be paid off gradually by his mother-in-law.

As these despatches took last week the moment after the couple are married they became the Duke and Duchess Vizer. The Emperor of Austria insists that the Royal Household to which the Prince is entitled by descent be dropped the moment he marries an American commoner and as the necessary consequence of this he renounced his claim to the throne of Portugal.

BLAMES THEOSOPHY FOR DIVORCE ACTION

MAJOR HANSON ANSWERS HIS WIFE'S CHARGES

President of the Central of Georgia Calls Theosophy a Modern Form of Paganism

Atlanta, Sept. 14.—Theosophy is claimed by Major J. F. Hanson, president of the Central of Georgia railroad, for the marital trouble that led his wife to bring suit, recent for divorce. Mrs. Hanson charged cruelty, neglect and too much attention on the part of the major to "Jack Turner, now Mrs. James McVicker, a beautiful young society woman of New York.

Major Hanson filed his answer today in superior court. In the opening sentence he says: "Further answering the plaintiff's bill, the defendant avers that until theosophy came in, an element of discord had existed and happily family when the theosophism of the defendant's family soon added to the zeal of new converts the arrogance, intolerable aggressions and bigotry of fanatics and sought to lead or drive every one around them into theosophy.

"The defendant's house at Macon, soon became the headquarters for this character of work in the city. The defendant's refusal to entertain the idea of ever becoming a theosophist because he regarded it as a modern form of Paganism, caused the first change in the plaintiff's feelings toward him.

"When every effort to force—the theosophy by putting up money for a universal brotherhood scheme had failed, the plaintiff with one other member of his family resolved to attack him in such a way that public defense would be impossible, and destroy him.

"The defendant further alleges that his association with Mrs. Horner is a mere incident in the campaign against theosophy and theosophists, and because they could not force him to buy his neck to the yoke of theosophy a few days ago.

"She told me she had made a study of 'paintistry.'"

"Well?"

"And she offered to read my palm, and 'let her'."

"Naturally."

"And then she told me I was going to suffer a disappointment in love, but would get over it and marry a poor girl."

"What did you say?"

"What could I say? She's rich and I had intended to propose to her that very evening."

Cheville, N. J., Sept.—After being rudely shoved aside by me to be room for younger blood, Chester Xeophon; whose hundreds of granddaughters are credited to a list of theosophists in the northern New Jersey, murdered three of his rivals, mortally wounded two others, and beat out his brains against a fence post today.

For several years Chester resigned supreme over the chicken roe of C. Dolenebeck. He was a kind father and a loving husband, and his feeble family were noted for their tenderness all through the section.

Mr. Dolenebeck decided that he would have to get another rooster, so he shut up the old fellow in an inclosure with a few bananas, and turned a younger champion into the henery.

In a frenzy of jealous rage Chester waded into the bananas, setting free the souls of three and pecking the other so badly that they will die. Thus he calmly committed suicide by bumping his head against a post of the inclosure.

RICH AMERICAN KILLS HERSELF

ELOPED TO WED AGAINST HER MOTHER'S WISHES

Her Husband, Who Had Been to Asylums, Figured Along Great White Way.

New York, Sept. 16.—Catalogues from London bring news of the suicide of Mrs. Jane Gordon Sartori Tertio, the beautiful young wife of Lawrence Tertio, a millionaire ex- inmate of lunatic asylums, with whom she eloped five years ago. She killed herself yesterday morning at Harrow-on-the-Hill in London suburb.

According to despatches Mrs. Tertio was a guest of Mr. and Mrs. Ackroyd. Mr. Ackroyd is the music master of the Harrow-on-the-Hill school. No one heard the shot that killed the young American woman. A servant found the body in the conservatory found her lying on the floor with her own revolver alongside of her. She was dead. Her husband left England for America early in the week.

The marriage of the couple created a social sensation at the time it took place on Aug. 29, 1904. The bride then only eighteen years old was prominent in the Philadelphia smart set, while Tertio's escapades had already made him notorious in Baltimore, where he first came to place along the eastern shore of Chesapeake Bay.

The pair became engaged at Narragansett Pier. Mrs. Sartori, the wealthy mother of the girl, wired from Europe forbidding the marriage. On the following day, with three friends of young Tertio, one of them Harry Lathrop Barber, and Leht, the couple motored to New York, where a marriage ceremony was performed by the Rev. Homer S. Taylor, assistant rector of the Church of the Holy Communion.

Mr. and Mrs. Tertio at once went abroad and spent much of their time in England and the continent.

Mr. Tertio, who was eight years older than his wife, became a well known figure on Broadway during subsequent visits to America, on which he usually came to New York.

Perin about six years ago visited the White House and declared he wanted to learn politics from President Roosevelt, at which he was attached him severely for a publication about a peculiar style of overcoat Tertio was seen wearing on Broadway, and while in a high state of excitement he visited Baltimore newspaper offices and offered to pay to have the letter published as an advertisement.

Perin was committed May 16, 1902, to Butler's insane asylum; Providence R. I., by Judge Ruckett. Dr. George L. Shattuck and Charles W. Higgins, who were subpoenaed by Judge Perin the father, testified at the hearing that in their opinion young Tertio was incurable. He had previously, in January, 1902, been taken to the McLean asylum in Boston, and escaped from there.

The elder Tertio testified on the witness stand that he had given his son the \$200, which he had squandered, and that he had been divorced from his wife by the death of the elder Tertio, who left a vast fortune, Lawrence Tertio managed to get out of the Providence institution, and from the McLean asylum in Boston, and returned to Baltimore. His marriage he divided his time between Baltimore and New York.

Mr. Ackroyd is a brother-in-law of the dead woman. No reason for her tragedy has yet been divulged, and it is said that Mrs. Tertio left no letters to explain her act. She was quite cheerful when she retired Friday night at a late hour.

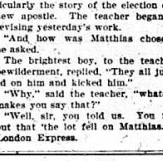
