The following article copied from today's Columbia State, in part, shows of especial interest to Chester people, and the farmers of Chester county in particular. Since Chester is preparing to incorporate a creamery it appears that a ready market will be found for the capacity of the creamery, which will mean much to the farmers of the county.

The article follows:

The cooperative creameries of the State have been granted permission by the War Department to erect an ice cream plant, which Mr. W. W. Long, State Agent for the farm demonstration forces and director of the common college extension department. Concerning the ice cream plant Mr. Long says:

The very gracious and generous letter of General Barthelemy is the splendid spirit of cooperation and interest in the particulars of this State. We must understand, however, that the army had made large contracts for furnishing supplies before the announcement was published at Columbia as they could not afford to take the chance of obtaining all the necessary supplies from local sources. In an industrial in General Barthelemy's letter, they will be very glad to purchase whatever they can from the farmers of the State. Mr. Long wrote a letter to Brig. Gen. Charles H. Barth at Camp Jackson:

"I am glad that in the name of the cooperative creameries of this State to thank you for the privilege granted us to erect an ice cream plant with the understanding of Columbia.

"These cooperative creameries have been established primarily for developing the dairy industry of the State. This year the demand for whole milk and cream has been so great and the prices so high that we have been obliged to import milk from outside the State to continue to be self-supporting in that they had to compete with the ice cream factories and soda fountain establishments. Your spirit of cooperation you have made it possible for the creameries to manufacture their products into ice cream and therefore they can offer the farmers of the State the highest market price for their milk and cream, which will assist the cooperatives in carrying out the object for which they were organized.

"Referring to your of the 3rd of August, concerning the purchase from farmers of South Carolina of additional agricultural products, I have to say that I have directed the division of horticulture and division of quarantine and division exchange officer to comply with your wishes wherever they can be done and consistent with the best interests of the command.

"I wish further to state that I am more than willing to cooperate with you in the plan to develop their agriculture. My best wishes go with you and your fellow citizens.
