Mr. W. F. Marion advises that 1,190 bales of cotton have been ginned in Chester county up to September 25th, this year, as against 8,840 for the same period last year. It is pointed out that the ginning this year is considerably behind last year. A number of people state that this year's crop is thirty days or more behind last season.

The cotton crop in South Carolina is later this year than for ten years, according to the government's ginnings report received in full by cotton men in Chester Wednesday. Cotton ginned up to September 25 this year in South Carolina totaled only 171,000 bales, as compared with 221,000 last year. The next smallest total for this time of the year in past years was in 1913, when the ginnings reported up to September 20 totaled 193,000. The next lowest to that was in 1912, when the ginnings reached 173,000 bales.

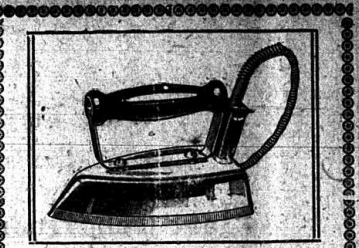
vey will cost about \$900, and it will probably take about a month to complete the survey. Some one will also be employed to get up the data with reference to taxable values, division of responsibilities, etc.
