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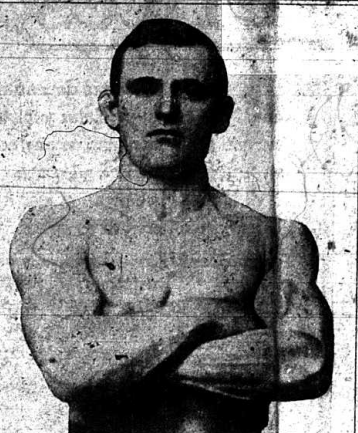

We know you have. We do not
 expect you to agree with us in all
 things. If you will only agree with
 us once a year we will be perfectly
 satisfied.

Some times something happens,
 maybe concerning your neighbor,
 and you wonder why the newspaper
 don't print it. Well, the average
 newspaper does not get any pleasure
 out of printing something that will
 possibly make some dear mother sad,
 or cause some dear wife, child or
 sweetheart to weep. These newspa-
 per fellows are "not near as bad as
 you sometimes think they are."

Listen. Not long ago one of
 Chester's citizens was caught with
 "moonshine" on his person. The law
 of the land laid its hands upon his
 shoulders. The News knew about it
 but rather than cause some dear one
 to suffer we passed the news item up.
 We believe in printing the news but
 means of causing little babies to suf-
 fer and in all probability they would
 have suffered if the matter had been
 publicly heralded. We have no sym-

 paper."

About to Leave Chester Out.

An important matter that was a-
 bout to escape action in the general
 election, which will be held on No-
 vember 2nd, was that of the Amend-
 ment to the Constitution of South
 Carolina with reference to the issu-
 ing of bonds by the City of Chester.
 It will be recalled that the last Gen-
 eral Assembly passed an act which
 removes the Constitutional Amend-
 ment for the City of Chester. Imped-
 ing the issuing of bonds to the City
 of the taxable value of property.
 This matter was to have been
 voted on in the general election and
 if carried, would be nullified by the
 next General Assembly after which
 Chester could issue more bonds for
 street improvements, water works
 and sewerage systems, etc.

The News a few days ago received
 a notice to publish about the holding
 of the general election on November
 2nd and noticed that the City of
 Chester amendment was not includ-
 ed among others to be voted on. The
 matter was called to the attention of
 city officials and yesterday Mayor
 Westbrook took the matter up with
 Secretary of State with the view of
 getting the matter placed before the
 voters of the State. It is evident
 that failure to carry the amendment
 in the list of others to be voted on
 was an oversight on the part of the
 State officials and it is expected that
 there will be no trouble in getting
 the matter straightened out so that
 it may be voted on in the general
 election.

If the amendment is carried, which
 in all probability will be the case,
 the City of Chester can no longer au-
 thorize more bonds for various im-
 provements in the city if so desired.

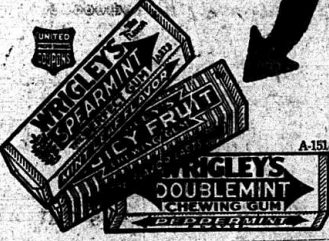

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Chester, in council assembled: That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to throw, place, or allow to be thrown or placed, or dropped from any street, alley, bridge, or other public place, or any paved street in the City of Chester, any stones, gravel, sand, coal, brick, glass or other rubbish, which may injure or damage said streets, or which may block or stop any drains thereon.

Any person violating this ordinance shall for each offense be fined not more than \$50.00 or be imprisoned for a period of not more than 30 days.
