RAILROAD HAS WATER WAGON

Contentious Said to Work Successfully in Minimizing the Discomfort of Dusty Tracks.

An appliance for sprinkling the right-of-way over the dusty stretches of track has been invented by Mr. W. H. Watson, superintendent of Los Angeles division, and is being tried out with apparent success by the Southern Pacific on its lines between Indio and Palm Springs, hereafter a very dusty section of track. According to the Los Angeles Digest, a writer in the Southern Pacific Bulletin (San Francisco) says: "The appliance consists of a perforated pipe attached beneath the water tender of the locomotive in such a way that water is sprinkled on the track as the train passes over it."

FRAGRANCE PRISON AIR

Electric Perfumer in Cleveland Court Jail Attroups Mind to All Kinds of Possibilities.

Altar of roses and sweet scents of Arabia! There's a electric perfume at the county jail. It casts all kinds of colored perfume on the prison air. Just turn the button and the jail becomes a garden of roses or fragrant with the scent of the most beautiful blossoms.

The other day the atmosphere of the jail reflected the aroma of the forest. The perfume of the forest, the pine, the cedar, the spruce, the fir, the maple, the basswood, the crab apple blossom, but it just happened that the perfume was charged with disease, an aroma thined with forest odor.

The machine has possibilities, the sheriff believes. It might be employed to awaken the prisoners each morning with accents of violets and soothe them at breakfast with odors of lily, geranium, fritters grapefruit and other goods not on the regular morning menu. At night it could discharge the odor of pineapple or fig or date, and stify prisoner with a good sense of smell and a strong temptation could readily go to sleep and feel that he was in Hawaii.

The perfumer is in jail only on trial—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Little Density in Fog: It takes a big block of fog to make one good swallow of fog, says Dr. W. J. Humphreys of the United States weather bureau at Washington. The densest fog of Newfoundland banks contains some 20,000 droplets in a cubic inch. Doctor Wells and Doctor Thurms of the bureau of standards found.

To get one gulp of water enough fog to fill a space 8 by 5 by 100 feet would have to be condensed. In a fog that size there are 60,000,000,000,000 particles of water. "It would take about a half hour to count an inch of fog particles," says Doctor Humphreys. Placed side by side, 2,000 in diameter, they would be needed to fill that length. "The droplets in a cloud have been found to be, on the average, twice the size of a fog droplet."

Oil From Sunflower Seed: The sunflower is a possible source of oil, a large quantity of it having been made from sunflower seed in Russia before the war. The cold-pressed oil is used for culinary and other purposes where a lighter grade of oil is required, while the hot-pressed is employed in making soaps and Russian varnishes. In 1911, more than 600 mills in the Caucasus were engaged in pressing sunflower seed. It is possible that the sunflower may some day be an important oil-producing plant in this country. The crop is now grown to quite an extent in some parts of the country, notably Missouri, for poultry feed.

Meteorite Fall in Saskatchewan: A fast meteorite plunged into the Big Quill lake near Wynward, Saskatchewan. "A body was seen by many in the district to drop from the sky and clouds of steam rose from the lake for some time after it had sunk in the water. Other meteoric disturbances are reported from Vancouver, Saskatchewan, southward as far as the Yukon," says Doctor Humphreys. People in the neighborhood heard five or six loud explosions and the earth heaved. Vancouver and the lake was shaken.—Montreal Gazette.

Huge Jellyfish: A jellyfish of beautiful translucent blue, weighing close to 60 pounds, was washed ashore on the south of England coast recently. The creature has seven odd-looking pinkish tentacles protruding below the body of it and had two crinoid resembling gills at breathing through. Some of its beautiful recollections of being stung badly by small sea anemones to think of a big fellow as this could do.—Exchange.

Now a great body of negroes can not be disciplined by a small number of whites and this the white Republicans well know. Hence their strategy is to minimize the number of negroes participating in party affairs. They arrange meetings confining local Republican politics to a small circle of leaders who can be trusted to do their bidding. This is one of the explanations of the negligences of the Republican vote in Southern states. The moment a negro party becomes numerous it becomes unmanageable.

The few white Republicans who are self-respecting and sincere men, discerning this condition, are, therefore, "Lily Whites."—Columbia State.
