The Government Estimates. After many private estimates showed 14,000,000 bales had appeared the Government issued a report on September 8th showing an estimated crop of only 12,744,000 bales.

It is practically certain that 15,000,000 bales will not be a burden upon the market if, indeed, they are adequate to meet the requirements of the cotton industry.

While not issuing any crop estimate or making any prediction relative to the course of cotton prices, we have for some time been warning the cotton manufacturing industry of the South that it was becoming too bullish or taking too much for granted.

A crop of 12,744,000 bales will face the planting of a new crop with the knowledge that in order to be at all safe we must start a rainy spell that could be of great value to the cotton crop.

GREAT FALLS NEXT. Bethel Presbytery Convenes at Lancaster—Will be Held at Fall in the Spring. Lancaster, S. C.—Bethel Presbytery convened at Douglas church in Lancaster county Tuesday and through Wednesday. This presbytery embraces the counties of Chester, Lancaster and York, and parts of Cherokee, Fairfield and Kerrawh counties in North Carolina and a part of Union county in North Carolina. The Rev. R. W. Moberly, of Lancaster, presided the opening sermon as the retiring moderator. It was an able discourse and held the close attention of his hearers. The Rev. W. W. Westers of Bullock Creek, was elected moderator, and the Rev. George B. Thompson, of Great Falls, permanent clerk. The election of the commissioners to the general assembly was made a item of the Fall, instead of the spring docket. The Rev. F. W. Stegway, D. D., of Chester, was elected principal commissioner to the general assembly, which meets at Pensacola, Fla., in May, and the Rev. J. W. Westers of Bullock Creek, and the Rev. D. H. Littlejohn, of Blackstock, were elected alternate commissioners. The Rev. G. W. Irby, of Richburg, was received from the Baptist denomination and ordained to the gospel ministry by the laying on of the hands of presbytery. Dr. W. W. McPeck of Little Falls, whose term as a member of the board of directors of Children's College, having expired, the Rev. F. W. Westers of Rock Hill, S. C., was elected to succeed him. The presbytery sermon was delivered by the Rev. R. H. Thomas, of Stevenson, of Lowry, and his theme was "Prebyterianism," the sermon attracted much depth of thought and profound study that presbytery decided to have it published in pamphlet form for distribution among the various churches of presbytery. The Rev. F. A. Dreagan, of Heath Springs, was appointed to deliver the presbytery sermon at the spring meeting on the subject "Bible and Modern Thought." The next meeting will be at Great Falls in the spring.

LARGE SAVING.
 Chief Highway Commissioner Says
 Number of Employees Has Been
 Cut in Half.

Columbia, Sept. 16.—Reorganization of the motor vehicle department has resulted in a reduction of the number of employees from 74 to 40, representing a saving in salaries of more than \$13,000 a month, Samuel McGowan, chief highway commissioner, told the joint committee on efficiency and consolidation today.

Mr. McGowan appeared before the committee to give information relative to the operation and organization of the highway department.

The changes made in the motor vehicle department about completed the reorganization of that department, he said.

The chief commissioner reiterated his statement made to the committee several days ago, that the professional force of the department was underpaid "from the highway engineer."

"While I have nothing to explain or apologize for, I would like to correct the impression," the chief commissioner said. "My criticism was directed toward the administrative and financial ends of the department, and not at the engineering department."

BETTER RADIO SERVICE IS PLANNED.
 Department of Commerce Will Make Extensive Investigation, Says.

Washington, Sept. 15.—With a special appropriation of \$125,000 virtually assured, Secretary of Commerce Hoover is having plans for a comprehensive survey of radio, which officials believe will greatly improve reception over the United States.

Scientists believe that static and other natural disturbances that seriously interfere with the entertainment of radio fans usually can be eliminated.

Officials explained that because of inadequate forces these complaints cannot be traced down, placing a great hardship on the millions of listeners in the country.
