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ENGLAND IN FOR AIR RAIDS

London, Oct. 4.—A policy of reprisals for German air raids over England has been decided upon by the British war office, it was announced today by General Smuts.

"Reprisals for the present will be limited to a few raids," General Smuts said. "We are most reluctantly forced to apply to the enemy the bombing policy which he has applied to us."

"Allow me to emphasize two points, which I hope will be borne in mind when it is ultimately found that our words are not half but more than half true," General Smuts said.

"Firstly, we did not begin the practice of bombing industrial and populated districts. The enemy began this practice first. It is his fault that we are now obliged to retaliate."

"Secondly, I must say that we do not fear them if, as the present evidence is, they are forced to use jet-propelled bombers, such as the Gotha."

"The effect of the scale under consideration will be to increase the pay of many war labor to the equivalent of more than 10 per cent over the scale for 1917, which expired September 24."

LEFT PRISONERS ON ISLAND TO STARVE
 Washington, Oct. 4.—Operations of German raiders in the Southern Pacific were revealed tonight in a dispatch to the navy department from Tutuila, Samoa Islands. The dispatch says that on August 21 the crew of the American schooner, the *Clare*, with a story of how the famous *Seward* had stranded on Moeha Island after destroying three American ships and how members of the *Clare* crew had set out for further depredation on commerce on other captured vessels.

It was August 2 when the *Seward* was abandoned and on August 21 her commanding officer, with three officers and two men, set out in a motor sloop, provided with machine guns, rifles, bombs and two months' supplies. On September 3 the remainder of the crew, including the French schooner *Lutece*, armed her and put to sea.

Twenty-seven white and 17 native prisoners from the *Seward* were left marooned on the island and the *Clare's* master brought word that they were in great need of food and water.

The American vessels sunk were the *Stable*, the *A. B. Johnson* and the *Manila*.

ENGRAVING BUREAU HEAD HAS RESIGNED
 Ralph Says His Action Had Nothing to Do With His Chief's Investigation
 Washington, Oct. 4.—Joseph E. Ralph, chief of the bureau of engraving and printing, which makes the paper currency and stamps, has resigned, to become assistant to the United States Intelligents Committee, a new bank note concern.

Mr. Ralph's salary in his new position will be far larger than the \$6,000 a year paid him by the government. He has been in office since the appointment of the Roosevelt administration ten years ago and is understood that Frank E. Folsom, now as chief of the bureau, will be named in charge of the bureau. Mr. Ralph will remain in charge of the engraving and printing until the new chief is appointed.

Mr. Ralph's resignation was given Mr. Folsom about a week ago. Mr. Folsom said that it was nothing to do with the investigation of the department's committee to investigate the bureau's affairs. It has not been accepted, so far as known, I am anxious to hear what action has been taken and hope that Secretary McAdoo will give a statement when he departs.

The administration of the bureau has been under investigation for several months by a committee headed by Assistant Secretary Crosby. The investigation has been a long one, and charges made by Representative Benjamin Rankin of Montana, that Mr. Ralph was overpaying the bureau employees there, a report made to Secretary McAdoo some time ago has not been made public.

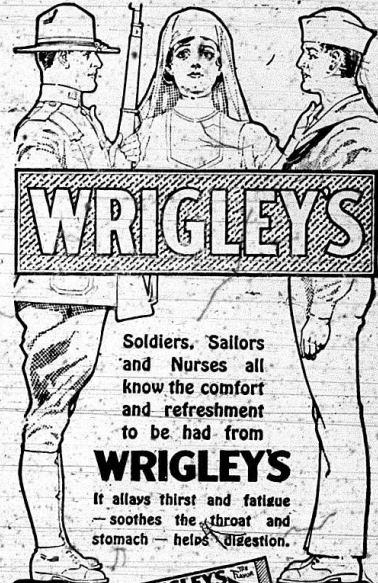

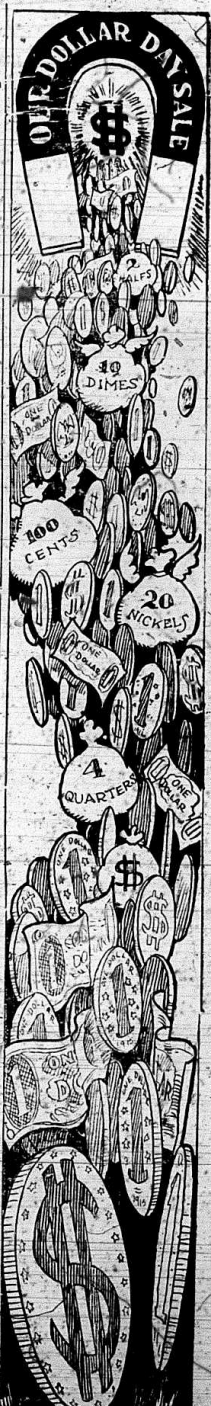
