A number of newspapers read expect a newspaper to have some editorial every issue and they turn to the editorial page for them. If per chance there should be none the reader is disappointed. Of course, he often turns to the editorial page and reads for three, or more, of which amount to anything and none of which interest him, nevertheless he expects them and if they are not there he growls.

Well, it's time I was writing an editorial for this issue of The News but I have been so busy and so absorbed in that new building being erected for The News that I cannot get my mind away from it long enough to think of anything that would editorially interest so many as I of my readers.

So the idea has occurred to me that I might write a little about our present plan of working streets and how you would order the material and then would come back that they did not have it? Up goes your plans with a bang and you must start all over to make your plans fit the material you can get.

I have been planning the arrangement of some shafting and pulleys, with which to operate presses and folding machine. Every plan I would make apparently had some disadvantage. Either this would be in the way or that would be in the way. I could not get the counter-shaft to turn in the way I wanted. Finally, I got everything lined up as I thought I wanted it and the lumber company did not have the kind of material I wanted. Then I had to change things to suit obtainable material. The lumber man now engaged in erecting the shafting and I guess it will be all right. But planning and then planning and changing again gives you plenty to do and when it is all over with the work has gained some more of life's experiences.

I find that there are many delays in erecting buildings. Things don't move like they ought to and your plans are upset. I have been the opinion from experience that the average contractor loses five per cent on each building he erects which is directly chargeable to delays of one kind and another.

I have been looking for some plan from Atlanta, Georgia, for several days and upon the arrival of the bill of lading we find that the shipment was routed over the Southern Railway, where the railroad has its office in Atlanta to Chester and is the logical line of shipment. An investigation of the shipping charges shows that the shipping cost is a great deal of time and money. Lack of efficiency in costing the people of the United States millions of dollars each year and it is rather surprising how some business men make money who do not consider the inefficiency of the men working for such business firms.

Henry Ford is being given credit for having one of the most efficient organizations in the world, and possibly he has. However, a few weeks ago, Henry announced a new model automobile and notwithstanding the lapse of several weeks have only seen one of them, and it was a touring car. His dealers and customers have been waiting for new style Fords for a number of days and yet they are not here. So it seems that even Henry Ford gets his business jammies once and awhile.

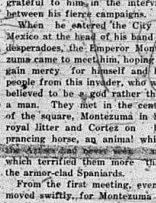
