TEXTILE NEWS.

Macon, Ga.—The Adams Dye Mill, which was recently destroyed by fire, are planning to rebuild.

Hickory, N. C.—The A. A. Shuford Mills Company will let contract in about 30 days for the erection of a 300-foot addition to their plant here. The mill now has 4,666 spindles on carpet yarn.

Wadesboro, N. C.—The Martin Hosiery Mills will install 20 new knitting machines in their recently-completed addition.

Spartanburg, S. C.—The Glendale Mills are planning to improve their mill, including the electrification of the plant and the installation of individual motors.

North Wilkesboro, N. C.—The Wilkes Hosiery Mills Company is installing 60 additional machines for making half hose and expects to have them in operation by October 1.

Clinton, S. C.—The Clinton Cotton Mills are having plans prepared for complete electrification of the power system and a new lighting system for Mill No. 2.

LaGrange, Ga.—Contract for the erection of the new rug and carpet mill to be built by Valley Weave Mills has been awarded to Thompson Bros., Charlotte, the building to cost about \$150,000.

LaGrange, Ga.—The Elm City Spinning Mill has let contract to T. C. Thompson Bros., Charlotte for the erection of an addition to their plant, the work to cost about \$150,000.

Cherryland, N. C.—The addition to the Ryne-Houser Manufacturing Company, Cherryland, 75x128 feet and will contain 5,000 spindles. It will cost \$300,000. Decision on the addition was reached at the meeting of the stockholders some weeks ago, as noted.

Kings Mountain, N. C.—The new Dilling Mill, for which Wilson & Bradbury will be the selling agents, is now nearing completion. The first cloth is expected to be turned out around October 15.

Combed yarn, dobbies, fancies, and rayon mixtures will be the initial product.

Laurel Hill, N. C.—The Morgan Mills are offering \$500,000 first mortgage gold bonds six per cent, the proceeds of which will be used for installing additional equipment and machinery to increase the output of the mills.

The Morgan Mills operate three textile plants, having a total of 14,500 spindles and also operate under lease the Marshville-Gotton Mills, at Marshville, which have 2,500 spindles. The company makes tire fabrics and yarns.

Kings Creek, S. C.—The Cherokee Cotton Mills, Inc., has been incorporated with a capital stock of \$100,000 by W. A. Love, A. W. Love and associates.

The company has a mill under construction here which was first designated as the Love Cotton Mills, but have just incorporated under the name shown above.

Chattanooga, Tenn.—Further details of the new plant being constructed here by the Central Franklin Processing Company, contract for which was recently awarded, as noted, show that the company is constructing a \$150,000 plant, 2 units, processing plant, 70x180 feet, shipping department 12x101 feet, machine and drying plant 42x41 feet, Gallivan Building Corp., Gallivan Building, Greenville, S. C. general contractors; A. E. Shirine & Co., engineers, 309 S. Main St., Greenville, S. C.; Converse Bridge Company, Chattanooga, has contracted the steel work; Wells Brick Company for bricks; Mountain City Stone Co., 609 Market St., for roofing; Beckham & Bender for excavating.

Tellico Plains, Tenn.—The Tellico Cotton Mills, now under construction here, will be ready to begin operations about the first of October. The mill will make coarse yarns. B. W. Bingham, formerly superintendent of the Fremderick Cotton Mills, will be general manager.

Augusta, Ga.—Cotton mills here are running at night on power from Muscle Shoals, Ala., through arrangements with the Georgia Railway & Power Co.

They received over new transmission lines a 3,000 horse power from midnight to 6 a. m., direct from Sheffield, Ala. This power will enable the Augusta and other mills to run six hours nightly from midnight to 6 a. m.

The Augusta canal probably will develop enough power to help on daylight running, and the power situation here seems to be on the mend, and should soon get better.

Mill Atry, N. C.—The Milltex Woolsen Mills, of this place, have been taken over by G. G. Slaughter, of Charlotte, and J. W. Stuyvesant, of Anderson, S. C. The plant which has been making slusher cloth, will probably be expanded later and a line of blankets will be manufactured. The mill here was owned by W. E. Lindsay and R. H. Whithead for many years.

Bessemer City, N. C.—The American Cotton Mills No. 2, which were incorporated here last week by Frank and Robert Goldberg, as

noted, have taken over the McLean Cotton Mills, which were formerly operated under lease by the Goldberg interests and more recently purchased by them at the receiver's sale.

Granite Falls, N. C.—Plans for the building a new mill here have been announced by the A. A. Shuford Mill Company of Hickory. The new plant, will manufacture nap and waste yarns and according to Mr. Shuford will be among the largest of its type in the company. The building will be 200x100 feet, two stories.

The Shuford Mill will also be enlarged by the building of a 200-foot addition. A. A. Shuford and associates control the Ivey, Shuford and Highland Cordage Mills here and the Granite Cordage Company and Graniteville Manufacturing Company, of Graniteville.

St. W. Carne is now second hand in weaving at the Lincoln Mills, Huntsville, Ala.

J. C. Hill, of Concord, N. C., has become office manager of the Brown Manufacturing Company, of that place.

W. L. Liggins, from the Sibley Mill, Augusta, Ga., is now night overseer of weaving at the Fountain Mills, Tarboro, N. C.

J. H. Ellis, of Paducah, Tenn., has become overseer of carding at the night of the Tellico Cotton Mills, Tellico Plains, Tenn.

Ralph Clark, of Lenoir City, Tenn., has become second hand in carding at the Knoxville Cotton Mills, Knoxville, Tenn.

J. E. Whitworth has resigned as second hand at the Ragan Spinning Company, Gastonia, N. C.

W. V. Jones, formerly of the Globe Yarn Mill, Mont Holly, N.

C. J. D. Poll has resigned his position with the Gibson Mills, Concord, N. C., to become manager of the new Hillcrest Silk Mills, High Point, N. C.
