

Lloyd George Makes Last Appeal To People Of South To Work For Peace.

Richmond, Va., Oct. 29.—Speaking at a luncheon here today, David Lloyd George, wartime premier of Great Britain, urged the America cast her might on the side of "hu-

manty and peace. "My lest appeal in leaving the capital of the South," he said, "if an anappeal to you who have memories of a great war which raged around this capital and who have more revous contributed to help liberty, that you should also cast the might and majesty of your nation on the side of humanity and peace."


