### TO KEEP LIBRARY OPEN

Ladies Will Canvas Residential District For This Purpose.

A number of ladies in the community have interested themselves in a one-day campaign, Monday, November 19th, for the purpose of securing subscriptions to the work of the Chester Free Library. The library has an annual circulation of some 10,000 books and there are over a 1,000 members.

The canvas will be made only in the residential section. The ladies believe that the \$100 necessary can be secured from this source without canvassing the business district, which has so many demands made upon it and responds so generously. The efforts to keep the library open is done largely in the interest of the children of the community, which use it extensively, and they believe that they should not be denied this privilege. The library was re-opened three years ago and has been conducted most successfully. A great many improvements have been made in it, and it is worthy of the support of the community.

There are no funds available to further continue it unless the people of the community desire to further support it and the ladies who have taken up the work in earnest believe that the Chester people will do their part to keep it open.

### Meeting of Study Center.

The third meeting of the Study Center for the teachers of Chester City and County will be held at the College Street School building next Saturday, beginning at 10 o'clock. Prof. J. E. Walmley, Head, Department of History, Winthrop College, will continue his courses in History, Supp. M. E. Brockman the courses in Education; Mrs. W. D. Rice, Supp. of Rock Hill City Schools, Primary Methods, and Prof. D. L. Rankin, a course in English Grammar.

As arrangements have been made for holding twelve meetings, teachers who missed the first two meetings can make up the ten meetings required for the renewal of their certificates if they start in with their work the coming Saturday.

Furthermore, all who attend ten meetings and successfully complete any two courses will be awarded a special certificate by the State Board of Education.

Winthrop College which will have professional value, as trustees and superintendents naturally prefer teachers who are working for greater efficiency. The Study Center Certificate is proof of a progressive teacher.

"I want to call the attention of County Schools," added County Superintendent W. D. Knox, "to the teachers in both City and the peculiar opportunities they have at our Study Center. Our instructors come right out of their schools so that they teach with experience in dealing with the problems with which the teachers deal daily. We are fortunate in having a corps of our strongest educational leaders. Contact with them is worth any effort it may cost to come to the Center meetings."

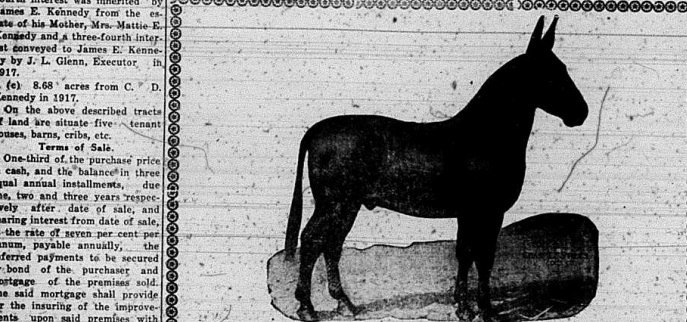

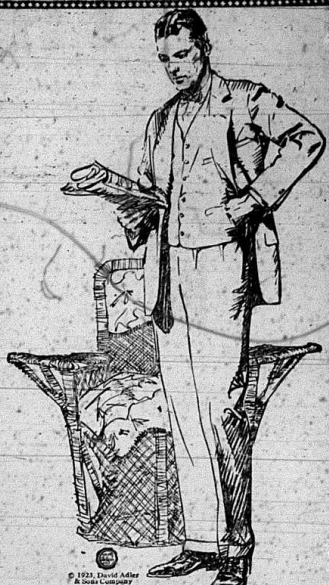

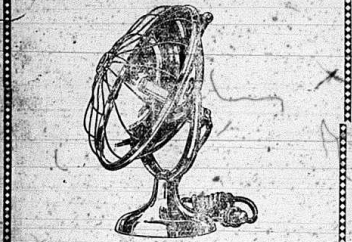
