Dr. A. F. Anderson.

A. F. Anderson died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. B. Allen, at Lowryville, yesterday morning early in the 22nd year of his age. He is survived by four children: Mrs. B. C. Lowry, Mrs. Jessie Bates, Messrs. W. D. Anderson and D. G. Anderson. The funeral exercises took place this morning at 11 o'clock at Zion Presbyterian church, the Rev. F. A. Drennon conducting the services. The remains were laid to rest in the cemetery of the church.

Dr. Anderson was one of the oldest citizens of Chester county. He was 91 years old on the 26th day of last September, having been born in Charleston, S. C. He moved to this county, where he has since practiced. He served through the war as surgeon of the famous fighting sixth regiment and was a splendid soldier. After the war he returned to this county and retained his active practice up to a few years ago when he retired.

Dr. Anderson remained vigorous within two days of his death. Saturday he complained of a pain in his left shoulder and Sunday he worked into his side. Early Monday morning it was found that he was unconscious and at 6 o'clock his spirit took flight. Dr. Anderson was the last of a distinguished family. For the greater part of his life he has lived in and near Lowryville and is known and beloved all over this and adjoining counties. He was a ruling elder in Zion Presbyterian church at the time of his death and was an exemplary citizen.

Married at Fort Lawn.

GENERAL SESSIONS COURT CONVENED

Judge Ernest Moore Presiding - Officials all in Their Places - Number of Cases Heard

The full term of the Court of General Sessions convened yesterday morning at 9 o'clock. In the absence of Judge Price, who is sick, Judge Ernest Moore, appointed as special Judge by the Governor, is presiding. Solicitor Henry and Stenographer McLaw were in their places when court convened. Judge Moore made a strong charge to the grand jury, congratulating them on the record of the county, spoke of the improved highways, and told of the usual duties of a grand jury. He referred feelingly to the sickness of Judge Price and expressed the wish that he would soon recover. All of the petit jurors answered to their names with the exception of R. F. Ford, W. Duke Anderson, J. B. Allen, and M. C. Campbell. The following petit jurors were excused: W. H. Edwards, Jr., A. W. McFadden, W. Duke Anderson, T. B. Reid, and W. J. Drye. A special venire of ten men consisting of S. C. Walker, Frazer Roof, D. L. Austin, G. R. Ball, B. Spratt, J. D. McDaniel, and J. A. Wylie were drawn to take the place of those excused and absent.

The following bills were handed to the grand jury, who retired and returned a true bill in each case: William Miller, housebreaking and larceny in two cases; Monroe Mills, burglary; John Rodman, obstructing the highway; Samuel Brown, Jr., assault and battery with intent to kill; Nathaniel Love, housebreaking and larceny; Frank Abell, assault and battery with intent to kill; Ben Chisolm and Lizzie Parks, assault and battery with intent to kill and carrying concealed weapons; James McConnaughey and Press Gayden, larceny of live stock; Fred Carter, violation of the dispensary law.

The cases disposed of in court yesterday afternoon were the following: Monroe Mills pled guilty to burglary and was sentenced to six months on the gall. William Miller pled guilty to housebreaking and larceny in two cases and was given six months for each, a total of one year. Samuel Brown, Jr., found guilty of assault of a high and aggravated nature and was sentenced to one year or a fine of \$100. He paid the fine. Nathaniel Love, pled guilty to housebreaking and larceny and was sentenced to one year to kill and was sentenced to six months or pay a fine of \$50. He paid the fine.

TODAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The case against Ben Chisolm and Lizzy Park, for assault and battery with intent to kill, was finished this morning. Chisolm was found not guilty while Lizzy Park was found guilty of assault and battery of a high and aggravated nature.

The case of Elmina Welch, for assault and battery with intent to kill and carrying concealed weapons, was under way when court adjourned for dinner and it will be finished this evening. The grand jury returned the following true bills this morning in addition to those in the dispensary cases: William Stewart, murder; Chalmers Barber, murder; Elmina Welch, assault and battery with intent to kill and carrying concealed weapons; T. Moore, larceny; Young, Lupton, Young, William Lupton, Greenbury Hardin and Randolph Allen for disturbing religious worship; Clarke McKinnon, for violation of the dispensary law; and Alfred Wright, for entering a house with intent to steal. A batch of bills for violation of this dispensary law are now being considered by the grand jury.
