Meat dealers in various parts of the country are hearing complaints practically every day now. The public does not understand why the retail prices of meats cannot be materially reduced when beef cattle are selling for such a low figure. A few days ago a petition signed by about 150 people was presented to the meat dealers in Fort Mill asking that prices be reduced. After reading the "public opinion" the dealers announced that they would make a reduction in their retail prices.

In discovering America, Columbus not only opened up a vast new home for man but for insect pests of cultivated crops and domestic animals as well. Fully 100 of these foreigners have made their way to American shores, and incidentally to American gardens and fields, up to the present. They have multiplied so that today their destruction of orchards, gardens, and farm crops is estimated approximately at \$500,000,000 a year—more than \$1,000,000 a day. Their havoc would be much more than this were it not for the quarantine and control work conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture through its Bureau of Entomology and its Federal Horticultural Board.

Farmers of Manatee County, Fla., this year will store sweet potatoes on an extensive scale for the first time, due to the work of their county agents. Because of the difficulty of obtaining proper storage, it formerly was a common occurrence for farmers to ship their potatoes to northern markets or canneries within a short time of harvesting, and later find themselves compelled to purchase potatoes by the 5-pound can at several times their original market price. A community storage house with a capacity of 10,000 bushels has been erected, and farmers have space allotted where they can place their potatoes and take them out at will.

Mrs. Harry J. Zahn, committed suicide at her home in Charlotte some time Sunday morning, by asphyxiation and was found dead in her room Sunday morning by neighbors.

Mrs. Zahn's husband left her about four months ago after a married life of twenty odd years, leaving a note in which he stated that he would be no use for her to hunt him. Mrs. Zahn was born in Germany and had no relatives in this country. For a number of years Mrs. Zahn was professor of music at the old Elizabeth College in Charlotte, and was a man of great means.

Mrs. Zahn had recently started attachment proceedings, against her husband's property, which amounted to fifteen or twenty thousand dollars. The home on Elizabeth Avenue, in Charlotte, was in her name and was worth ground \$20,000.
