### GENERAL SESSIONS COURT ADJOURNED

Court of General Sessions finished its work and adjourned Wednesday evening and the Court of Common Pleas began work yesterday morning. The following cases were disposed of by General Sessions Court before adjournment:  
John Crain and Thomas Smith alias Crowing Tom, charged with violation of the dispensary law were found guilty but sentence was suspended during good behavior.  
T. G. Moore, John Young, Wm. Lipsey, Greenbury Hardin, and Randolph Allen, charged with disturbing religious worship, had their cases not pressed.  
T. G. Moore was found guilty of assault and battery with intent to kill and carrying concealed weapons and was fined \$50. The same cases against John Young and Wm. Lipsey were not pressed.  
Judge Moore overruled a motion for a new trial in the case of John Eckman, charged with obstructing the highway. The case will go to the Supreme court on appeal.

### UNION MEETING SABBATH NIGHT

Laymen of All the Churches Will Meet at the Presbyterian Church at Seven Thirty O'clock Sabbath Evening.  
In general with other parts of the country the laymen of the Chester churches will hold a union meeting Sabbath night at 7:30 o'clock at the Presbyterian church. This time has been decided upon instead of 8:00 as previously announced. A committee consisting of Mr. M. S. Lewis, of the Presbyterian church, Mr. G. L. Anderson, of the Methodist church, Mr. R. E. Moffat, of the A. B. P. church, and Capt. W. H. Edwards, of the Baptist church, met last night at the home of Mr. G. E. Anderson and arranged the program for the union meeting on Sabbath night. The services will be opened with song followed by short statement, which returns will be followed by another song. There will be short prayers by Messrs. J. A. Hafner, Joseph Lindsay, L. D. Childs, and G. E. Johnston. This will be followed by scripture reading by Messrs. W. J. Irwin, J. B. Dye, W. D. Knox and Dr. J. B. Bigham, which will be followed by a song. Ten minutes talk by Messrs. Wm. McEwen, J. K. Henry, and J. L. Glenn will be followed. There will be another song followed by the benediction.  
It is important that the people note the change of the time from 8:00 o'clock to 7:30 o'clock Sabbath evening and the meeting place is the Presbyterian church on Wylie street. As a consequence there will be no services at any of the other churches Sabbath night. The service is the outgrowth of a call sent out by the Laymen's Missionary Movement, meeting at the Presbyterian church, November 14th, as a day of prayer for the success of the great campaign of endeavor undertaken by the Laymen's Missionary Movement. A national missionary campaign for the United States has been undertaken by the Laymen's Missionary Movement which involves a holding of men's conferences in 15 of the leading cities of the country, a series beginning in Buffalo, October 10th to the 16th, culminating in a national missionary congress in Chicago from the 8th to the 16th, 1910. Sabbath, November 14th, the evening of the 3rd anniversary of the movement is to be observed as general day of prayer for the success of the campaign. The meeting in this city Sunday evening is a union meeting of the laymen of all the churches and a tremendous crowd is expected to attend at the Presbyterian church. The services begin promptly at 7:30 o'clock.

COMMON PLEAS COURT Hamilton Courtney vs The Southern Railway suit for killing a horse, resulted in verdict of \$125 damages for plaintiff.  
COURT PROCEEDINGS I. L. Morris vs the Manassa Mills, suit for damages, resulted in verdict of \$800 for the plaintiff.  
By consent of all parties an order was signed by Judge Moore in the case of J. B. Hefley, deceased, directing that the sum of \$872.28, now in the hands of the clerk of court, be paid to the plaintiffs, less any cost of clerk.  
The case of J. Harris McConnell vs the Southern Power Co., for damages is now being tried.

Got Sixty Days on Gag. George Hughes, colored, was brought here yesterday by Constable Varnadors, of Magistrate J. B. Reed of Richburg, and taken out to the gas to serve sixty days on the charges of vagrancy and petit larceny. Hughes is charged with entering the house of Mr. K. P. Ballard, near Edgemoor, yesterday night and was caught hunting something to eat. He was given sixty days for the two offenses mentioned above and is now serving his sentence.

Former Chester Man Dead News has just been received in this city of the death of Mr. T. Ferguson, a native of this county but who for the past twenty years a resident of Texas. The death was sudden and occurred while Mr. Ferguson was on his way from his home at Corsicana to San Antonio. He was riding in a buggy by himself when a man who was following him saw his hat fall off in the road and going to him found him dead in his buggy. This occurred on Nov. 2nd. The funeral was held the next day at home and was conducted by Rev. D. N. McLaughlin, of Austin, Texas. The deceased was about sixty four years of age and is survived by his wife, six sons and one daughter as follows: Ed, Herbert, Clarence, Ernest, Arthur, and Mrs. Mary Alfred.  
Mr. Ferguson was a native of Landford township in this county. He married Miss Nannie McPadden, a daughter of Mr. John O. McPadden. While a young man he served in the Confederate army as a member of the cavalry. About twenty years ago he moved to Texas, settling within two miles of Corsicana where he resided at the time of his death. He was a staunch abolitionist and his death is universally regretted.

To Fed Without Choking. There is much danger of choking cattle if small potatoes and apples are fed whole, and it is a big job to cut or mash them if a large quantity is to be fed.  
It is perfectly safe to feed either to hogs or sheeps in any kind of a feed trough, but not so with cattle. With the following method, however, they can be fed safely.  
If two pieces of timber are put just far enough apart so the animal's neck can be held between them, and a hole bored through at such a height that the cow will be prevented from raising its head up to a level with the body, there will be no danger of choking. J. S. Woodward, in the Indiana Farmer.
