CHESTER OFFICERS KILL ALLEGED BOOTLEGGER

Sid Clyburn, of Rock Hill, shot and killed by Chester County Officers, near Landis. Early Saturday morning—Inquest held at Saturday—Auto contained Fifty Gallons of Whiskey—Montgomery and Hamp Montgomery and Lillie Hoye—Officers Had Been Advised of Coming Liquor Car.

Saturday morning about four o'clock Sid Clyburn, of Rock Hill, was shot by Chester county officers and died a few minutes thereafter from the wound, which was inflicted in his side, near the shoulder blade. The shooting took place near the bridge over Fishing Creek at Landis.

Chester county officers had been advised of the coming of a liquor car. The officers took the car to the bridge and blocked the entrance to the bridge over Fishing Creek and awaited the coming of the alleged liquor car.

About four o'clock the officers saw a car coming, the Chevrolet being distinguishable as it rounded the curve near the bridge. The car was a 1925 model and was driven by a man who was identified as Sid Clyburn. The car was stopped and the driver was ordered to get out of the car.
