THE CHESTER FOOTBALL TEAM

Says Winnabore Ought to Play Chester—Respect to Challenge Florence

(Written for The News)

The football game here, Thanksgiving day between the Chester and Greenville High School teams gives the Chester team the best claim to the championship of the Western part of the State, and the right to oppose Florence, the champion of the Eastern part, in Columbia for the season.

There is one other claim out to the Piedmont championship—Winnabore—but it is the purpose of this article to have the two claims investigated and settled, if possible. The Chester management wishes to contest the championship game; and also the championship team, in the two claims. It sincerely hopes that respectfully requests that they will look into and investigate the matter before they decide who shall meet Florence for the championship.

The following are the games played by both teams in the Piedmont section at the score in each game:

Chester has played the Piedmont and Winnabore three times. Chester has scored 211 points more in her five games than Winnabore did in three. A comparison of the above games will clearly show that Chester is the stronger of the two teams. Winnabore has played other games but none that would count in deciding who will win the state championship.

The Greenville team claimed the championship of the extreme western part of the State until Chester won two games from them in the season. Chester therefore claims the Western championship. If true Chester has lost one game and Winnabore one, but Winnabore has refused to play Chester a return game, which was arranged for once on the 16th of November. The Chester management has written several letters asking for a return game with Winnabore but the Winnabore management declines to play. Chester, therefore, wishes to hereby publicly challenge Winnabore for a return game to be played anywhere in the State, provided a referee is secured who will be satisfactory to both teams. The Chester management also wishes to challenge any team which has a fair claim to the Western championship and in case Winnabore or any other Piedmont team fails to play Chester and win from it, Chester hereby challenges Florence for the State championship.

Chester wishes to warn the Florence team that if it plays Winnabore and wins, that Chester will challenge Florence. It is the fact that Winnabore has only played three games in the Piedmont as against Chester's five, and has won one twice against Chester's four, and also because there are many who think that Chester has the strongest team in the upper part of the State. Chester feels free, and confident to claim the championship of the Western part of South Carolina.

It has been officially announced at Camp Sevier, that the tournament which was put off Friday November 10th, will be held Friday provided no unforeseen developments take place.

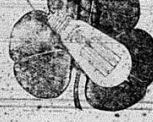
