Building operations in the United States are booming along merrily. If the cement industry may be accepted as a criterion, the housing problem will soon adjust itself. The production of cement since April of the present year has been a million barrels a month in excess of the best previous months in record. For the past five months the cement factories of the country have been producing at the rate of 137,000,000 barrels a year. Brick production is also on the increase. Nearly all the manufacturers of bricks, supplying the larger centers, are running to capacity. The lumber business is good, and in all lines pertaining to the manufacture of building material there is a general activity, denoting that the country is feverishly active in building operations from coast to coast and best of all, there is no immediate prospect of any falling off of these activities.

Greensboro, Dec. 17.—G. F.
