ROCK HILL, S.C. - The Peace, Justice, and Conflict Resolution Studies Minor at Winthrop University is sponsoring a Death Penalty Awareness Series this fall.

One of the highlights will be the appearance of **Sister Helen Prejean**, author of "Dead Man Walking," on Oct. 29.

- Sept. 27: Winthrop Chapter of Amnesty International will show a film, "Too Flawed to Fix," moderated by Adolphus Belk, assistant professor of political science, 7 p.m. Location: TBA.
- Oct. 18: HBO Film Preview, "The Trials of Darryl Hunt": A story about a Winston-Salem man who spent 20 years in prison for a murder he did not commit. Darryl Hunt will be present to answer questions following the film, scheduled for 7 p.m., Plowden Auditorium.
- Oct. 24: Faye Sultan and Brad Tripp, assistant professor of sociology, lecture on "The Sociology and Psychology of the Death Penalty," 8 p.m., Owens G02.
- Oct. 29: Sister Helen Prejean, author of "Dead Man Walking," will give a talk entitled "Dead Man Walking: The Journey Continues," 7 p.m., Tillman Auditorium. The theatre department, under the direction of professor Annie-Laurie Wheat, will put on the play "Dead Man Walking" from Oct. 31-Nov. 4 in Johnson Studio Theatre. Except for the play, all events are free and open to the public.
