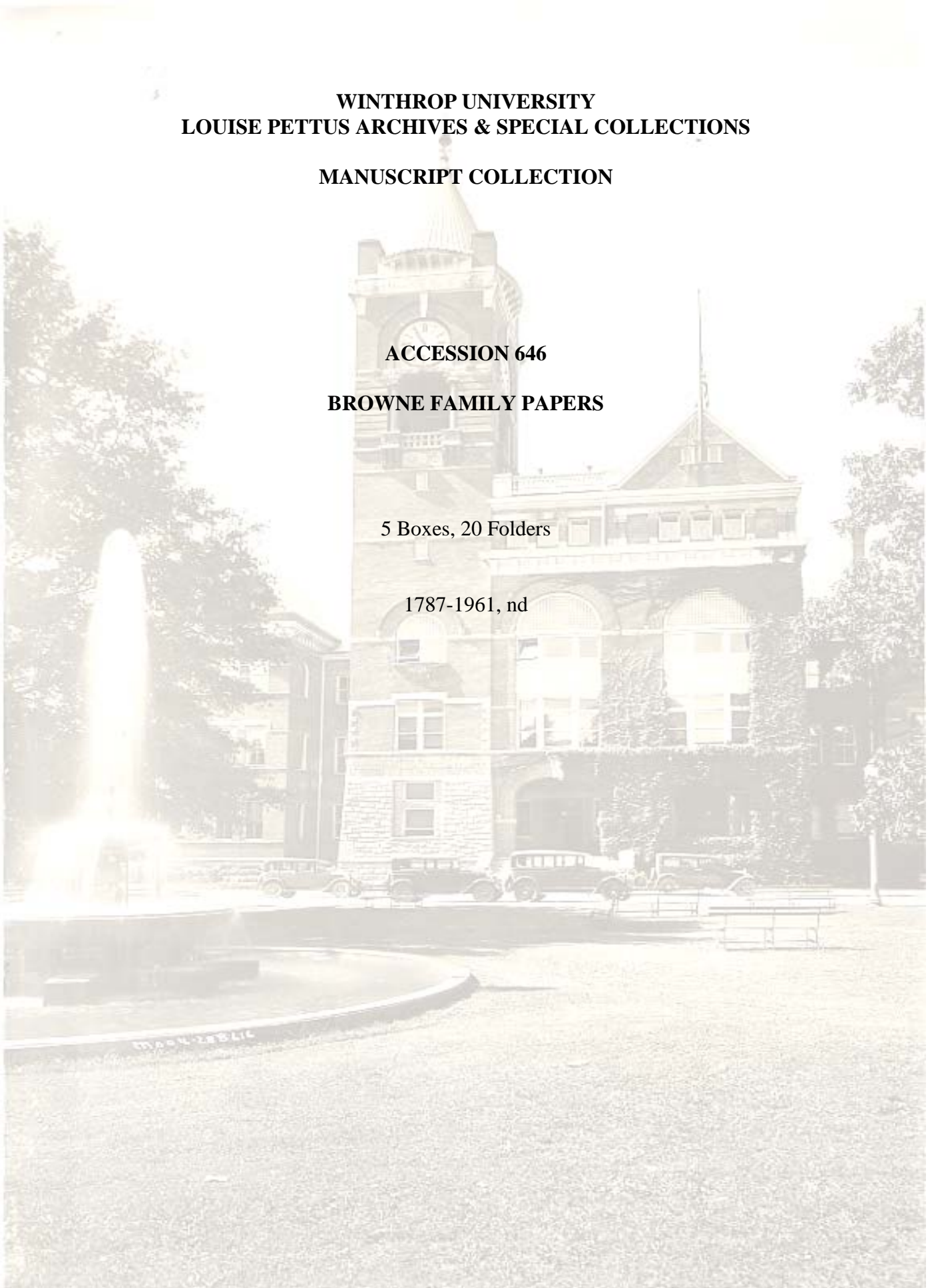

Scope and Content: **The collection consists of correspondence, legal papers, land plats, receipts, bills, genealogy, a copy book, photographs and miscellaneous papers relating to the Browne Family of Anderson County, South Carolina. The incoming correspondence (mainly from the 1840s to the 1850s) is primarily addressed to Newton Browne and Jane Morris Browne from various relatives, The collections also includes information on the allied families of Breazeale, Carpenter, Dobbins, Gunnin, Hillhouse, McFall, McGregor, and Morris.**

The majority of the correspondence is from the 1840s and the 1850s. To understand the relationships between the correspondents, refer to Box 4, Folder 15, Browne Genealogy. 3	10-12	LEGAL PAPERS Consists of deeds, indentures, agreements, wills, contracts, estate records and mortgages relating to the Browne, Morris and Breazeale Families. In chronological order.	1789-1945, nd
4	13	LAND PLATS Consists of plats of property owned by the Browne, Morris and various other Anderson County families. In chronological order.	1787-1955, nd
4	14	RECEIPTS AND BILLS Consists of receipts and bills for various things. In chronological order.	1840-1926, nd
4	15	BROWNE GENEALOGY Consists of the genealogy of the Robert Browne Family who emigrated from Dumfries, Scotland to Anne Arundel County, Maryland and eventually settled in Anderson County, South Carolina. Original arrangement.	nd
4	16	THE NAME AND FAMILY OF BROWN(E) Consists of a history of the Brown(e) name compiled by The Media Research bureau of Washington, D.C. Original arrangement.	nd
4	17	HILLHOUSE GENEALOGY Consists of a typescript genealogy of the Hillhouse Family which is of Scotch-Irish origin. Rev. James Hillhouse immigrated to Connecticut about 1717. Later in the 18 th century, a branch of the family settled in York County, South Carolina. The genealogy traces the family through the early part of the 20 th century. Original arrangement.	nd

Browne, Martha Watson, Amanda Eskew, and Mrs. Fannie Riley, in yard or garden, taken by Anderson's Studios and the other photograph is of farmers bringing their cotton to sell in the town of Anderson, S.C. probably before the turn of the 20th century.</p>	nd
