Dr. C. P. Shedd and Bishop U. V. W. Darlington To Deliver Sermons Sunday

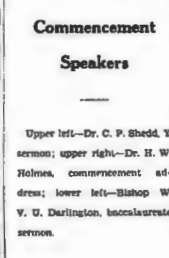

Miss Buffington has been at Winthrop one year.

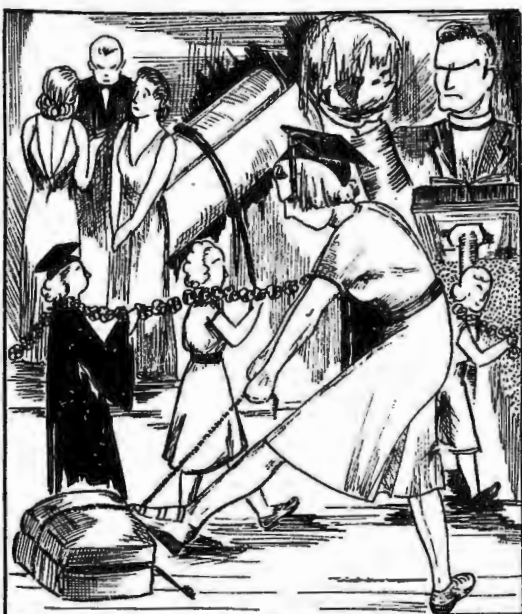
Cottriss President Of Music Club

Noapoles, many of them, in the field of journalism, the senior staff members have plunged into this business of getting out a senior

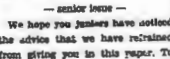


paper with an enthusiasm that is little short of inspiring at this time, and shall we say, condition of year.

273 ARE CANDIDATES FOR DEGREES AND CERTIFICATES

Four M. A.'s To Be Awarded

Four Carolinians will receive the Master of Arts degree at Winthrop's graduation exercises next Monday at 10:30 in Main auditorium.

These are the last Masters degrees that Winthrop can give, under the present ruling. No new candidates for an M. A. have been accepted since 1932. In April, 1932, the time limit for the completion of the work began in 1931 expired.

Candidates for the Master of Arts degree and their fields of work are: Edmondia M. Blakely, Mathematics, C. education; Harriet Elizabeth Calk, Rock Hill, English; Hazel Owens, Rock Hill, education; and Lona Marie Parke, Fort Mill, education.

113 Seek A. B., 130 B. S. Degrees

Two hundred sixty-nine students are candidates for degrees and certificates at Winthrop's fifty-second graduation exercises next Monday at 10:30 in Main auditorium.

Of these 113 are candidates for the Bachelor of Arts degree, 130 for the Bachelor of Science degree, and 20 for the two-year commercial science certificates.

Last year Winthrop conferred 26 degrees and certificates, of which 113 were A. B.'s (the same number as this year), 116 were B. S.'s, and 33 were two-year commercial certificates.

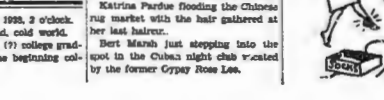
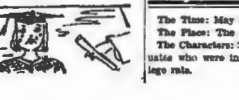
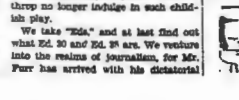
Junior Break Chrysalis; Are Full-Fledged Seniors

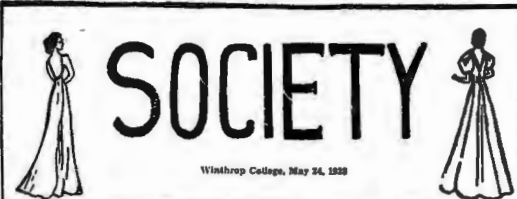

Tours, "Sings," Sports, Conferences, Lectures, Weekend Trips, No Afternoon Class Are Attractions

John Thomas, as director of Recreation, and Roberta Macfie, as Y secretary, present Winthrop seniors will aid in the work of the summer session extending from June 8 to August 5, according to an announcement by Dr. Willis D. Magginn, director.

Not only will the eight week session offer nine semester hours credit for regular students and practical aid to classroom teachers in curriculum problems, but will afford pleasant campus life.

Besides the regular courses carrying three semester hours each, there will be organized trips and tours, group "sings," planned games and recreations, and conferences and lectures. In order to carry out this program, there will be no afternoon classes.

Weekend trips will embody historical spots, scenes of natural beauty, industrial plants, commercial institutions, art collections, and state institutions.

Assembly will be held weekly on Wednesdays, and reports will be conducted in the amphitheater Sunday evening.

Average cost for the fall session will be about \$72.00, board and room for the eight weeks being \$40.00. Students may gain six semester hours in six weeks, however.

Extra charges will be made for private instruction in music, and

for the sixth year. Mr. Edwin Hughes will hold his master class in music.

Special aid to teachers in problems of curriculum will consist of forums with a special adviser who will attempt to meet any problems put before him by a student. The program for the students will then be planned so that all work will help in the solution of the problem.

Bulletins for those interested in coming to summer school will acquaint students with the exact nature of the material offered in the following main courses: art, biology, chemistry, commerce, education, English, geography, health education, history, home economics, library science, mathematics, astronomy, modern languages, music, penmanship, philosophy, political and social science and psychology.
