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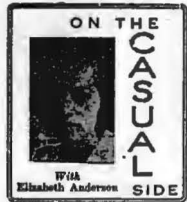

Crabb Takes Inventory Of American Stock

That the strength of America today is a focus of the strong characteristics brought from old nations by the "founding fathers" was expressed by Dr. A. L. Crabb, of George Peabody College, Nashville, Tenn., at a Winthrop address at the Founder's Day exercises on Tuesday. "Foremost in the settlement of our country were the Scotch-Irish, the greatest pioneers the world ever produced," said Dr. Crabb, "and the 'fighting Irish', the political backbone of the world, who served to advance that work."

Dr. Crabb, speaker at the eighteenth observation of Founder's Day, commencing the words and ideals of Dr. David Benneft Johnson, founder and first president of Winthrop college, was introduced by President Phelps. In introducing his lifelong friend and associate to a large audience of students and alumnae Dr. Phelps said: "There is throughout the South, no closer student of educational institutions and of men in education." The program included an invocation and Scripture by Dr. A. S. Rogers, pastor of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian church, and music by the Winthrop sextet.

Former Winthrop Student Discovers Pellagra Cure

There is a place in the sun for every Winthrop daughter, and Mrs. David T. Smith, formerly Susan Cooper, a Winthrop alumna, class '16, has found hers. The sunny place she occupies sends a shower of bright beams to millions of lives the world over, for Mrs. Smith, in collaboration with her husband, and Dr. Julius M. Ruffin, of Duke University, proved that niacinic acid cures pellagra, dreaded scourge of a million poor rural families in the South, a deficiency disease which strikes whites and blacks alike. Dr. and Mrs. Smith informed the National Academy of Sciences that niacinic acid, a waste chemical product from cigarette factories in the South, works swift wonders with pellagra sufferers, transforming patients broken in mind and body into keen, energetic workers. Niacinic acid can be produced from the rejected portions of tobacco leaves by a very little cost. Tiny

1938 Budget Cut; State Group Lops New Request \$180,000

New Post Office Regulations Announced; James W. Leslie Appointed Post Master

After February 1 Winthrop letters will bear the postmark "Winthrop College Station, Rock Hill, South Carolina." On that date the federal post office department will take over the College post office, and James W. Leslie, a civil service employee will come to Winthrop to serve as postmaster, according to L. C. MacFadden, Rock Hill postmaster. There will be a complete revision of boxes. Girls will have boxes according to dormitories. Roommates will use the same box. A rental fee—five a quarter—will be charged. For students who do not want to rent boxes, there will be a general delivery section at the Winthrop College Station, Rock Hill, South Carolina. No one will be allowed to post notices. No provision other than sending the notices to dormitory offices has been made to meet this problem, according to A. M. Graham, business manager. Strict federal rules will be observed. The post office hours will be about the same as the ones now. The windows will be kept closed during the entire putting-up of the mail. No student or faculty member will be allowed inside the post office. The assistant to the postmaster will also be a civil service employee.

Officials Fear Grave Effects Will Follow

Two heavy blows have been dealt the College budget in the past 30 days by action of the State Budget commission. The current operating budget was cut \$41,522.62 to obviate a state-wide budget deficit at the end of the year. Happening after six months operation according to the old budget, there is scarcely any way for the deficit to be absorbed, thinks A. M. Graham, business manager. Salary contracts have already been made. Repairs work has already been done on several of the buildings. Contracts for College expenditures have been made on the basis of the old budget figure. President Phelps and Mrs. Graham have, however, expressed their intention to make the necessary adjustments to affect as little as possible the present session's program. For the year 1939-40, Winthrop requested \$390,000 from the budget commission. That figure was cut to \$215,000 by the commission in its recommendation to the state legislature. Notwithstanding this cut of \$180,000, Winthrop anticipates an increased enrollment of 100 students in the year 1939-40. This cut reduces the appropriation per capita so alarmingly that there will be difficulty in operating the school, it is said. "The hope is," says Mr. Graham, "that the General Assembly will come to our aid and make provisions for the extra made by the Budget Commission."

Basketball Group In State Meet

A state-wide basketball institute will be held here tomorrow according to Miss Maxon Cassey, instructor in physical education and present chairman of the South Carolina officials rating board. The purpose of the institute is to raise standards in girls' basketball. Invitations to this institute have been extended to all South Carolina college and high school basketball coaches and college girls interested in basketball. Miss Christine Wiley, national chairman of basketball for women and Miss Dorothy Davis, secretary of the North Carolina women's basketball officials rating committee, both from the Women's College of the University of North Carolina, and Miss Ted Tidwell, of the physical education department of Limestone college, will assist with the program. The institute is expected to become an annual event meeting at different sections of the State each year. Miss Alice Bond, chairman of the Georgia state board of women's basketball officials, from the University of Georgia, is also expected to be present. Winthrop girls planning to take the officials rating examination are Catherine Ann, Kelly; Grace Forber, senior; Frances, senior; Mary E. Kneese, senior; Dolly Sledge, senior; and Ruth Strigley, special student.

The composition was presented on a program by Vladimir Gelschmann and the St. Louis Symphony orchestra in the municipal auditorium, St. Louis, Missouri. A St. Louis critic of the composition said, "In shimmering color it sings, its moods as various as those of innocent childlike abandon, a militant if not military force, a deeply religious mysticism, and an ironic mockery of our own times."

Dr. Gruber Presents Mozart Choir Boys as Artist Course

Last night the Mozart Boy's Choir of Vienna conducted by Dr. Georg Gruber, presented a program of choral works in the Main auditorium in Winthrop's sixth Artist Course number this year. The troupe of 20 pre-adolescent boys was organized from the time-honored Bastians in Vienna. The choir has toured the British Isles, Canada, Mexico, and South America. They came to this country in January, 1938. Three of the soloists had the distinction of singing under Toscanini in 1887 at the festival at Salzburg in Mozart's "Magic Flute". They were selected by Toscanini to represent temple acolytes. Their repertoire includes the upper, "Bastian and Bastians", "Hansel and Gretel", and a musical play, "Tales from the Vienna Woods". The conductor, Dr. Georg Gruber, is Vienna's first-born. He was graduated from the State Academy of Music in 1906, and was appointed conductor of the Haydn Basilica choir in that same year. In 1926 he conducted the Bach-Mozart Festival at the Calton theater in Buenos Aires.
