

The Catawba Regional Planning Council was established in 1971 is now known as the Catawba Regional Council of Governments (COG). The organization is an association of South Carolina local governments in Chester, Lancaster, Union, and York counties. "The council assists local governments and other agencies with various programs and helps to locate and secure funds for project developments. A board of local elected government officials and private citizens appointed by their county councils directs CRPC's activities. Citizen advisory committees provide vital ideas and local perspectives on area issues to the Council Board and Staff."









## 11. Landsford Canal (1980)





LANDSFORD CANAL --Listed on the National Register of Historic Places Location: Along the Catawba River in northeastern Chester County, South Carolina.

Landsford Canal is a two-mile canal with three stone locks--one single and two double.

The Landsford Canal was a part of a plan to link Charleston

to the Mississippi River through a series of waterways.

It was built in 1823 under the direction of Joel Poinsett, chairman of the South Carolina Board of Public Works, and Robert Mills, state engineer and architect, who later designed the Washington Monument.

A mastery of planning and workmarchin went into the construction of A mastery of planning and workmanship went into the construction of this project.

The name, Land's ford is derived from a grant in 1754 to Thomas Land of a tract containing an ancient ford. There was much activity here during the Revolutionary War, centering around the forces of General Sumter and General Davie. It was here where Cornwallis General Sumter and General Davie. It was here where Cornwallis crossed the Catawba in retreat from Charlotte to Winnsboro. It was here in 1805 where General William Richardson Davie, renowned soldier and statesman, built his home overlooking Landsford and built a mill on the river which is still in evidence today.

The Landsford Canal is included in the National Register of Historic Places. The South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation & Tourism have plans to turn the area into a state park and renovate certain of the canal's features.
